THE annual report of the Dunk River Dairying Co. is a very satisfactory one. During the year 2,091,195 lbs milk were received; 88,555 lbs butter were manufactured and sold at an average of 20.53 cents per pound. Four settlements were made for milk during the year. The lowest figures were paid for May and June milk, 62.38 cents per 100 lbs; and the highest figures were paid for Nov. and Dec. milk, 75.07 cents per 100 lbs. Rev. J. J. McDonald received the highest figures paid for milk, \$1.18 per 100 lbs. Nov. milk. The largest quantity was furnished by John Craig who supplied 58,849 lbs milk, for which he received \$399.61. The next largest patrons were Herbert Leard, George McFarlane, Wm. McCallum, A. T. Wright, Charles Craig and John Anderson.

## SOME NOTES ON THE LATE CONVENTION

Held by the P.E.I. Fruit Grower's Association in the Kindergarten Hall.

THE beautiful silk flag spread over the President's desk at the Fruit Growers' meetings was that purchased in Montreal by the Exhibition Association and awarded for the best county collection of fruit. Father Burke won it in September for Prince County but he will have to hold it next year again before it becomes absolutely his. The other counties have their eyes on it now and whoever holds it will have to get a superb collection together. It was presented to its present holder at the first session of the F. G. A. meeting by Exhibition President Hazard and Father Burke spread it over his desk saying, "This is the County banner which we have taken to Prince County and what we have well hold." "You'll have to work for it" shouted a dozen Queen's and King's champions.

The exhibition of fruit, etc., was the centre of attraction. F. G. Boyer as well as having many varieties of apples on exhibition had a sample of Black B-n Davis, received from Green's nurseries, Ohio. It was a large highly colored apple. The "unnamed varieties" table was crowded full of plates. Many of them were identified by the officers long before Prof. Macoun arrived. Richard Burke and Mr. Tanton did the judging of the standard varieties and did it well. There were some superb apples in these classes, better than any other country could produce. The whole exhibit was very large, more than Ontario shows at such fairs. Near the bottled fruit was Father Burke's collection of Native Tree Seeds for windbreaks, comprehending the whole range of native tree seeds, the Hard and Soft Maple, White Birch, White and Black Ash, Wild Cherry, Red Oak, Arbor Vitae, Cedar, Red, White and Black Spruce, Balsam Fir, Larch, White and Red Pine and Manitoba Maple. The seeds were put up in glass vials, sealed with red wax, and made a pretty show as well as affording an object lesson to those interested in tree culture, a thing which is not! There is no trouble, Father Burke says, in collecting seed enough in one season to re-forest the whole Island. Everybody should learn how to gather and sow it.

John Robertson's fine exhibit of fruit in barrels and boxes reached town only on Wednesday at noon, too late to be shown which was a great disappointment as was also the non arrival of the N. B. and N. S. fruit in transit. The compliment paid Mr. Robertson by his name sake Prof. Robertson must have compensated for much annoyance. "The Inkerman box, put up by John Robertson of P. E. I. is the best box on the British market," were his words. There was great applause when he said this.

Proy Lane's exhibition of packing in barrels was much enjoyed by a large class. Next year this contest will be lively.

A three days session will be little enough time to transact the growing business of the F. G. A. in future.

The diplomas awarded were very artistically given up and very much resembled those given at Glasgow, only they were prettier. Mr. Hazard took pride in making a good job of them as they will hang for many a day on many walls in the provinces. There was a text of Scripture in the head lines—"Be of good courage and bring to us of the Fruits of the land"—and a collection of fruit in the arch above. The sides were Grecian pillars and the arms of the Province were below. The text ran—"Fruit Growers' Association of Prince Edward Island Winter Exhibit of Fruit February 10th 1903. This is to testify that—has this day been awarded first diploma for—A. E. Burke, President, A. E. Dawar, Secretary, Prof. Williams of the Commercial College filled in the blanks in a manner which called forth unstinted praise.

Four of the young lady stenographers of Mr. Miller's Commercial College reported the proceedings of the meetings. They did their alma mater credit. The report will contain all the transactions.

There were many friends of birds among the fruit growers and Mr. Stewart's attack on Robin in his paper on Cherries brought Mr. Dickey of Muddy Creek to his feet at once. "Who killed Cook Robin?" was a vital question again.

There was not the slightest hitch in the whole proceedings of this large convention. Everything went like clock work, the president with consummate tact guiding everything through in its place.

Those from starved plots, immature when picked and improperly stored may have no good flavor, but where conditions are right, give us an Island apple.
