GOAL GETTERS IN NORTHERN HOCKEY LOOP

HALIFAX, Dec. 14.—The position of the Fredericton Capitals at the top of the Big Six hockey schedule along with Dalhousie Rangers is reflected in the scoring efforts of that club's front line strikers. Making a field day of their final contest against Truro Bearcats, Arnie Mosher and Aubrey Webster boosted them into leading places while Sammy McManus drew up even with Vince Ferguson, Halifax winger, who had held a two point margin over the field earlier in the week.

MOSHER ON TOP

Mosher, the former Eastern League star, won into first place with four goals and five assists for a total of nine points. Webster by virtue of four big goals against Truro Friday night, leads with the most number of actual goals scored, seven and trails Mosher by a single point.

ISLANDERS NEXT

Following Ferguson and McManus come the Charlottetown wingmen, "Baldy" Schwab and Jackie Kane, both formerly of the Hamilton Tigers. The latter, who made a personal matter of it in defeating the Halifax Wolverines, Friday night, scored four goals altogether and gave one assist for five points. Schwab scored one less and gave two assists.

Bracketed with four points each are Joey Beaton, Fredericton; Red Cook, Moncton; Jerry Bradd, Halifax, and Reg Shields, Truro. Dalhousie's leading goal getter was Arnie Butterworth, who with "Chuck" Jemmett, the Eastern Nova Scotia League leading marksman last year, bagged three goals.

EASTERN LOOP GETS UNDER WAY DEC. 28

NEW GLASGOW, Dec. 14.—The opening gun of the 1931-32 Eastern Hockey League campaign will be fired on New Glasgow and Kentville ice surfaces Monday night, December 28, the New Glasgow Tigers taking on the Halifax Wolverines while the Kentville Wildcats clash with the Truro Bearcats at the valley town, according to the new schedule which was approved and passed by N. W. Mason, League President, and released for publication to The Halifax Herald representative tonight by Wm. M. Hamilton, Secretary of the League.

Truro and Halifax will have their home games two nights later, the Hub team being scheduled to meet the New Glasgow Tigers on Dec. 30, while the Halifax Wolverines will entertain the Kentville Wildcats at the Forum the same night.

HOOLEY SMITH LEADS THE GOAL GETTERS

MONTEAL, Que., Dec. 14. (By the Canadian Press)—Reginald "Hooley" Smith, right wing of the Montreal Maroons forward line, continued to lead the point makers of the National Hockey League, despite a rather stormy week end in which his penalties aggregated more than the total he previously had compiled in the entire season, according to a statement made here today by Frank Calder, President of the National Hockey League. Four goals and nine assists bring Smith's total up to 13 points.

Dave Trotter goes into a tie with Charlie Conacher, right wing of the Toronto Leafs for second place in the Canadian section. Each of these players has 12 points. Wm. Cook, right wing of the Rangers and Aubrey Clapper, who serves in a similar capacity for Boston Bruins have 11 points each and are tied for the lead in the American division.

A triple tie exists for third position in the Canadian division between Nels Stewart and A. C. Siefert of the Montreal Maroons, and Howie Morenz of the champion Canadiens. Each has ten points and Siefert leads the trio on goals scored with eight. Third place in the American division is held by Frankie Boucher, of the Rangers, with 9 points, while George Owen of the Boston Bruins has 8 points. Stewart, of Maroons, and Eddie Shore, of Boston Bruins are tied in point of penalties, each having served 32 minutes.

Wage Reduction Effective Today

OTTAWA, Ont., Dec. 14.—(By The Canadian Press)—Steps to ensure that the wages of the 26,000 railway employees affected by the recent findings of the Board of Conciliation would be safeguarded in the event of the 10 per cent reduction being made in their pay cheques next Tuesday were taken yesterday in Montreal, and notice has been served on the Vice-Presidents of the Canadian National and the Canadian Pacific Railways, according to Hon. James Murdock, Vice-President of the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen, here tonight. The object to be achieved in serving the necessary legal documents on the companies, Mr. Murdock said was to make certain that when the employees received and signed for their pay on Tuesday, Dec. 15, they did not sign away their right to collect later the 10 per cent which, as things are at present, would be deducted from their wages.

(The recommendation of the Conciliation Board was that the 10 per cent deduction be made retroactive to November 15.)

The writ on Saturday was filed through a notary public in accordance with the laws of the province of Quebec, Mr. Murdock said.

Left Handedness Not Increasing

MONTEAL, Que., Dec. 14.—(By The Canadian Press)—Left-handedness is not on the increase and never can be declared Dr. W. D. Tait, professor of Psychology at McGill University, recently. "You cannot change nature" asserted Dr. Tait, "and because many people who were originally left-handed and were taught to be right-handed are now coming back to the use of the left hand, or because it is no longer found advisable to teach left-handed persons to be right-handed, it does not follow that left-handedness from birth is on the increase."

The theory that left-handed people who are taught to be right-handed frequently become stutterers is now definitely established," declared the McGill psychologist. "For this reason educators no longer teach left-handed children to be otherwise."

Asked as to the reason for left or right-handedness, Dr. Tait said that the accepted theory is that it is due to a pre-natal condition. "If the child lies on the left side of the mother," he said, "it has its left arm and hand very slightly cramped while there is freedom to develop the right arm and hand and vice versa."
