ISLAND LADY DEAD - Mr. F. Fitzsimmons, 176 King St., Charlottetown, received word yesterday morning of the death of his sister, Mrs. Patricia Sherry, aged 64, who died on October 28th in Chicago, Illinois. The deceased was a daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. William Fitzsimmons of Vernon River parish.

DIES IN HOSPITAL - James Quinn, an elderly man, who has been working on various farms throughout the province, died in the City Hospital Saturday. He had been picked up on the road near Johnston's River, Oct. 14 by Mathew Ryan and brought to the Charlottetown Hospital. Quinn who sometimes gave his name as James Lahey was said to be a native of New Brunswick.
