MAKES MARBLE FROM ASHES IN 30 MINUTES.

BERLIN, March 28—A German engineer has invented a way to transform ashes into marble of exceptional beauty. He refuses to divulge his secret, though large inducements have been made to him by owners of marble quarries. It is a matter of chemical synthesis, of course, but it is said that his only visible apparatus is a small gas stove, together with a kettle and what resembles a copying press. With these implements, plus the secret he holds, he has manufactured a medium sized slab of marble in half an hour.

HONEYMOON SCHOONER BACK AFTER LONG TRIP.

BOSTON, March 28—The "Christina" schooner, R. W. Hopkins, aboard which Captain Fred B. Balano and bride have spent a long honeymoon, is in port here. Last November the vessel, stowed full of apples, pears and ice, sailed from Mystic wharf for Brazil to catch the holiday market at Rio de Janeiro with Captain Balano and his bride on board. Some of the fruit brought fancy prices. From Rio the Balanos voyaged to Barbados, where orders were received to proceed to Jacksonville and load lumber for Boston. The vessel was stormbound at Vineyard Haven, and the tug Neposist was dispatched to hurry her to port, where her consignees were anxious for the cargo.

COLLEGE PROFESSOR MAKES NEW TRIBUTE.

ANN ARBOR, Mich., March 28—Professor S. J. Zowski, head of the department of hydraulics at the University of Michigan, has designed a turbine which, it is said, exceeds by nearly 50 per cent. the power of any other turbine ever built. The new wheel, the last of four recently designed by Professor Zowski, was tested at the United States testing flume in Holyoke, Mass., Monday, and recorded an efficiency of 89.2 per cent.

HIGH COST OF LIVING IN CANADA.

OTTAWA, March 29—The Minister of Labor tabled in the Commons yesterday a report of R. H. Coates, of the Department of Labor, on the rise in wholesale prices, particularly during the past year. It is shown in 1911 prices were higher in Canada than at any time save the years 1872 and 1882, the most pronounced hoist taking place during the last half of the year.

Wholesale prices during 1910 were 24 per cent higher than the average for the last ten years of the last century. In 1911 the percentage went up to 27, due in great measure to the crop shortages.

The present high wave began to make itself felt in 1903. Volumes of figures are cited and tables shown to indicate how the rise occurred. The principal commodities affected are dairy produce, fish, fruit, vegetables, groceries, provisions, footwear, fuel, house furnishings, drugs, oil, tobacco and textiles.

Those who object to the mandate claim that the new order will revolutionize the language.

PARIS, March 28—At the Roussel sale in the Galerie Georges Petit, \$140,337 was realized from the great variety of art objects offered, which included all that is left of the great collection. The tapestries brought high prices. The highest price of all, \$50,000, was paid by Seligmann & Company for a salon set, consisting of a large sofa and four large armchairs of carved and gilded wood, with seats and back covered with Gobelin tapestry of the period of the Regency, and showing on a yellow ground garlands of flowers, fruit and birds and varietal arabesque.

PROVIDENCE, R. I., March 30—Application of the Grand Trunk Railway for a lease of part of the New State Docks, which are in progress construction at the port was followed today by the introduction in the General Assembly of an Act authorizing the Harbor Improvement Commission to lease a dock for terms of 20 years, or less. At the same time messages were sent to the Senate by Governor Potvier urging the authorization of the issue \$1,000,000 bonds to complete construction of the docks and other harbor improvements.

NEW YORK, March 28—As the geese once saved Rome, so did they save the life of a man on the Atlantic transport liner Minnewaska, from Southampton. Among the ship's passengers were 300 high bred and race fowl, many geese among them, and their quacking so disturbed the keeper in charge of them that he went on deck. As he reached it he was just in time to see a monster wave washing one of the passengers overboard. He caught the man's coat and held fast to it, so the wave went overboard but the man did not. He has the geese to thank for it.
