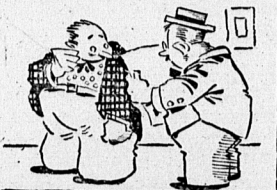

Miss Eileen Greenan, of Kinkora, is to be congratulated on having passed the entrance examinations, having a total of 549 marks.—B.

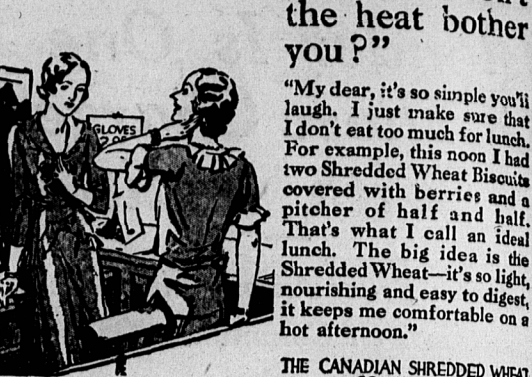
