Canadian Cattle Healthiest In World

Mrs Massie Shows Anger On Stand; Tears Document

Eyes Of Accused Naval Lieut's Wife Blaze When Confronted With Evidence — Many In Court Room Weep During Course Of Famous Honolulu Murder Trial.

HONOLULU, April 20.—A document presumably containing evidence of a rift between her and her husband was destroyed by Mrs. Thalia Massie in a dramatic flash of anger on the witness stand today while she was testifying in behalf of the young United States naval officer and three others accused of murdering Joseph Kahahawai.

Aged Man Shot By Young Bandits

N.B. Town Scene Of Dastardly Shooting And Robbery Last Night — Victim Dying.

(Thursday) (By the Canadian Press)—Shot in the head by one of a pair of strangers, for whom the Royal Canadian Mounted Police from Bathurst are now hunting, George Smith, 65-year-old storekeeper here, lies at his home in a dying condition. Little hope is held out for his recovery. He had not regained consciousness since the shooting, said to have occurred at about nine o'clock last night.

RED FLAG OF COMMUNISM IS RAISED

At Afternoon Session Of U. M. W. Convention At New Glasgow — Several Glace Bay Delegates In Sympathy With "Reds."

NEW GLASGOW, N. S., April 20.—The red flag of Communism was raised at this afternoon's session of the United Mine Workers of America convention and several delegates all from the Glace Bay sub-district, hastened to stand under its folds. It had been anticipated that Thomas Kennedy, international secretary treasurer, and personal representative of John L. Lewis, would speak, but instead the afternoon was spent in discussing the sub-heading "Communist group" inserted in a Canadian Press despatch appearing in the Halifax Herald of this morning. Mr. Kennedy who had hoped to get away tomorrow morning in order to fill pressing engagements is remaining over another day.

GOV'T. WILL SAFEGUARD CAN. RIGHTS

Minister of Marine Makes Statement In Commons With Reference To St. Lawrence Waterways.

OTTAWA, April 20.—(By the Canadian Press)—The Dominion Government may be trusted to safeguard Canadian rights in connection with the St. Lawrence waterways development, said Hon. Alfred Duranleau, Minister of Marine, in the House of Commons today. A tendency existed in some quarters, he said, to turn the scheme into a political football and "strange voices and strange arguments are heard, particularly in Quebec."

New Records In Operating Efficiency

NEW HAVEN, Conn., April 20.—In spite of curtailing revenues, the New Haven railroad established new records in operating efficiency during 1931, President J. J. Pelley told stockholders today at the annual meeting.

Citing the decision of the Interstate Commerce Commission recommending Federal regulation of highway motor traffic, President Pelley urged support by stockholders of legislation to effect such regulation. Railroad difficulties, he said, "have been severely accentuated by unregulated forms of transportation."

AUTO PLUNGES INTO RIVER, THREE DROWN

Cattle Shipments To England Are On The Increase

Canada Shipped 26,000 Head To The British Market Last Year—Excellent Health Of Canadian Cattle Voiced By Meat Traders.

OTTAWA, April 20.—Canada last year shipped about 26,000 head of cattle to the British market which is a revival of a trade that many years ago ran into even greater proportions and then dropped off entirely. The excellent health of Canadian cattle voiced before the meat traders in England substantiates the claim made in this country all along. The feeling here is that the trade in the United Kingdom has gradually been coming to realize that the restrictions placed on Canadian cattle are unfair. One restriction is that cattle for shipment to Britain must be quarantined for three days before going on the ship. This may seem trivial but it adds to the cost as do various markings which must be put on the cattle.
