Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

THE sole head of a family or any one over eighteen years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions.
Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 50 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.
In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.
A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300.
The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

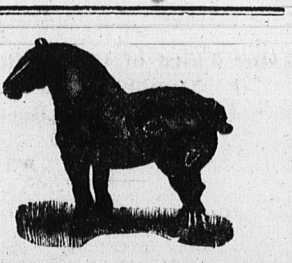

SEEDS AND SEEDING

Prepared for the National Service League by J. A. Clark, Director Experimental Farm, Charlottetown.

The season for the Spring Drive on the farms of Prince Edward Island is almost here. Our brothers in France started the great British Drive about one month ahead of the time our teams will be hitched to turn out the first sod in the greatest effort in the production of foodstuffs ever put forward by our farmers at the call of our Empire's need. The greatest and most insistent call to-day from Lloyd George and our other leaders is for the greater production of essentials. Foodstuffs must be produced and forwarded to our Mother Country and to our Allies at the Front. Every extra pound produced and wisely used counts towards Victory. It is the many small contributions that will count for more in the aggregate than all the great enterprises.

The staple foods that have the greatest sustenance value are among the essentials. Professor R. Harcourt, Chemist at the Ontario Agricultural College in the last Agricultural Gazette in comparing one dollar's worth of the staple foods, places rolled oats first and gives it a comparative value of 100. Using rolled oats then as a basis a few of the other foods mentioned are valued as follows: Wheat flour, 91; Sugar, 62; Rice, 62; Skim-milk, 47; Barley (pearled), 44; Beans, 42; Potatoes, 36; Butter, 21; Cheese, 19; Porkham, 16; Beef (except flank), 10; Eggs (when 48c per dozen), 5.

CANADIANS IN GAS MASKS.

Can Prince Edward Island then increase the supply of essential foodstuffs: oats, wheat, barley, beans and potatoes? Can we produce: butter, cheese, beef, and eggs? We not only can, we must do everything possible in order that we may have a maximum of all these.

The best available figures show that we grew in 1916: 199,000 acres of oats, 34,500 acres of wheat, 3,500 acres of barley, and 31,000 acres of potatoes with an average yield of: 35% bushels oats, 17 1/2 bus. wheat, 29% bus. barley, and 206 bus. of potatoes per acre. The average was good, but we hope that every man who knows how to produce these crops, whether he is retired or not, will strive this year to increase that average thus saving the Empire. The yields though comparing favorably with those of the other four Eastern Provinces, are far below what we can do. This is the point where the spring drive in Prince Edward Island can make its greatest gains.

The Canadians on April 9th, took Vinny Ridge. Let us all, about May 9th start our Drive with farm implements over the ridges and hollows of our province to produce 9,000,000 bus. of oats, 750,000 bus. of wheat and 8,000,000 bus. of potatoes. To do this would only require a 25 per cent increase in our yield, or that the average for the province be raised to 48 bus. of oats, 21 1/2 bus. of wheat and 257 1/2 bus. of potatoes per acre. Can this be done? We know that it can? Dr. Creelman says that the yield in Ontario can be increased 20 per cent by the use of the best clean seed alone. At the Experimental Station the average yield of all fields in round numbers in 1916 was: Oats, 63 bus.; wheat, 25 bus.; barley 49 bus.; and potatoes 272 bus. per acre. These yields were produced by using CLEAN SEED; the best varieties treated to prevent diseases and through clean cultivation.

The fanning mill and grader, if well handled, will produce the clean seed. Varieties known to do well in our Province are: Oats.—Banner and Old Island Two-row; Potatoes.—Erie, Red Erie and White Russian; Barley.—Charlottetown No. 80 and Old Island Two-row; Potatoes.—Green Mountain, Irish Cobblet, McIntyre, and Dakota Red. These represent types, if you have varieties that have done better for you than those mentioned select your own seed and grow better crops. Our best markets demand white potatoes, but these varieties must be sprayed thoroughly with "Bordeaux" for blight.

Good Tillage methods and thorough persistent Cultivation are the keys to the situation in the greater production campaign for 1917. By this means alone, working at the right time, all of the crops of Prince Edward Island could be increased more than 25 per cent. Horses are plentiful. We have fed them much valuable food during the past winter. Let us rig our implements so that the greatest number of horses can be used to advantage with the least manual labour. Improved implements for three and four horses would be a good investment. Fertilizers and barn yard manure would help greatly about the farm implements now on hand can do the work. Let us remember Charles Kingsley's words: "The secret of thriving is thrift; saving of force; to get as much as possible done with the least jar and obstruction, the least wear and tear, and the secret of thrift is KNOWLEDGE." Every National Service League is a centre where information and help may be secured on any farm or garden problem.

FIELD BEANS

Prepared for the National Service League by W. T. Graham, Ass't. Field Husbandman, Experimental Farms, Ottawa.

Field beans are grown successfully on a great variety of soils. They do particularly well on rich loams, and sandy loams. It is essential that all soil be well undrained either naturally or artificially. Even clay soils, will grow beans satisfactorily.

Rotation

The bean crop fits well into a rotation assisting in the preparation of the soil for grain crops which usually follow. Beans ordinarily follow clover or grass sod.

Harvesting
Where labour is sufficient and small areas only are grown the beans may be pulled by hand. Where grown in quantities, they can be harvested with a bean harvester which is a two wheeled implement possessing two flat knives placed to form a V cutting two rows at a time and placing the side delivery rake and thus bring bunch the beans by hand, others use from three to five rows together. It is important to keep the beans clean and to store them dry with a little weathering as possible.
Specially constructed threshers are available. Sometimes with special arrangement the common thrasher can be used, however, by this means there is more loss through beans being broken or split which cannot be sold either for commercial or for seed purposes. For small quantities or for a special variety grown for seed it is often more profitable to do the threshing with the flail. Messrs. Carter & Co., Seedmen, have in stock a large supply of Yellow Eye Beans, which will be supplied (by arrangement with the National Service Board) at the special price of 15 cents per pound to all persons applying for them.
