A CONGREGATIONAL meeting of the Souris Presbyterian Church was held on Monday, July 28th. David Sutherland being called to the chair. After the opening address from the chair-man the aim and object of the meeting was set forth and explained by Charles Sterns on the advisability of extending a call to one had of the many candidates whom we have the pleasure of hearing during the past two months. John McLean spoke strongly in favor of taking some decided action in the matter while Messrs. J. G. Sterns, Dr. Houston and other felt inclined to hear from other candidates before choosing. The meeting not being a fully representative one, no decided action was taken in the matter. The building of a manse was also discussed and it was decided to take immediate steps to ascertain the possibility of obtaining pecuniary assistance from the Century Building Fund. For this reason A. Currie was appointed as a delegate to present a memorial setting forth our claims for assistance to the Presbyterian Synod which meets in Charlottetown this week for their endorsement after which it will be placed before the Assembly which meets at New Glasgow in October for consideration. Other matters being attended to the meeting was adjourned till Wednesday, August 6th when a full meeting is requested.

The Boston Herald says:—When H. H. Rogers, the Standard Oil and Amalgamated Copper magnate, commissioned Architect Charles Brigham to erect and equip the church at Fairhaven Mass., for the Unitar society, the one restriction imposed was that everything throughout must be of the very best, for the structure was to be a memorial of Mr. Rogers' mother, and no expense should be spared in making it a fitting one. Several years have since passed, and the residents of Fairhaven and the many visitors to that pretty town view with admiration the handsome architecture, with its abundance and intricate detail of stone carving. Although the building may not be finished before next summer, the question of procuring a chime of bells that would be in keeping with its surroundings and a pleasure to its hearers has been under consideration for nearly two years, during which time bells of American and foreign make were investigated. Associated with the architect in this particular was J. Wallace Godrich the well known organist of Trinity church. The result has been the placing of an order, with the Meneely Bell company of Troy for a chime of eleven bells, which will weigh completed, over ten tons, at a cost exceeding that of any chime of bells in America and any chime in the world made in modern times. It is confidently expected by those having the matter in charge that this will be the finest set of bells in fullness and softness of tone in existence. (The Meneely Bell Company supplied the peal to St. Paul's Church of this city.

It is expected that the Provincial Sunday School Convention will be held this year in Charlottetown about the 20th or 21st of October. Marion Lawrence is planning to be present. Mr. Lawrence visited the Island last year and was given a most cordial reception. This is the first year the Province has done regular work with an organizer. One of the interesting features of the convention will be the presentation of about 50 diplomas to normal graduates.

Advices state that fully 20,000 Farm Laborers will be required to gather the tremendous wheat crop in Manitoba and Assiniboia. The Canadian Pacific have made arrangements whereby one way second class tickets to Winnipeg will be issued from all stations in the Maritime Provinces on Monday, August 18th, at rate of \$10.00. At Winnipeg the Manitoba and Territorial Governments are arranging for a committee of Representative Farmers from every district to meet the laborers and engage the required number of men for each section and the Canadian Pacific will furnish Free Transportation from Winnipeg to points on the Main Lines as far as Moosejog and to Branch Line points Southwest and North-west of Winnipeg in Manitoba and Assiniboia. It is hoped in this way to avoid the overcrowding in certain sections and the scarcity in other sections which occurred last year when the laborers before purchasing their tickets decided to what section they would go. Each laborer will be furnished with a farm laborer's certificate which, when filled out by the farmer with whom he works and presented to Canadian Pacific Ticket Agent at that point at the close of the harvest season, will entitle him to return ticket to starting point at \$18.00 any time prior to November 30, 1902. On this excursion 100 lbs of baggage, wearing apparel, will be checked free on each ticket. Half tickets will not be issued children but tickets will be sold to women as well as men as there is a very large demand for female help throughout the entire West, especially at this season of the year. Special Farm Laborer's tickets will of course not be honored on the "Imperial Limited". The business will probably be handled on passenger extra trains the entire distance. Tickets will be issued only via the Main Line going and returning. Artisans and clerks, unless strong and accustomed to manual labor and able to work hard as Farm Laborers, are not wanted on the Farm Laborer's Excursions. Anybody who is unable or unwilling to work at least one month as a Farm Laborer should not go on these excursions. If any further information is required parties thinking of making the trip should communicate with C. B. Foster, D. P. A., C. P. R., St. John, N. B.
