MEETING OF PROVINCIAL SEED FAIR ASSOCIATION

An important meeting of the Provincial Seed Fair Association was held in Summerside Wednesday afternoon. In the absence of the President, Rev. Dr. Gauthier, the Vice President, Mr. J. J. McNally occupied the chair. The Treasurer submitted the financial statement after discussion of which it was decided to postpone the payment of the expenses of the managing directors till after the Seed Fair of 1916.

A committee consisting of Messrs John Grady, J. J. McNally and Robert Agnew was appointed to confer with the ladies' and the merchant's of Summerside regarding a household science exhibit, it being understood that if one should be held provision

must be made for the prize list. The Hall Committee recommended that the Seed Fair be held in the Gunn Langlois building which the Manager, Mr. John Grady, said could be secured for the purpose.

It was decided that the next Provincial Seed Fair would be held on February 29th, March 1st and 2nd. The following special committees were appointed:

- To prepare prize list for General Seed Growers Association: Messrs W. H. McGregor, Alex. McFarlane and Thomas Waugh.
- To prepare prize list for Standing Fields of Grain Competition, Messrs Cornelius McLellan, D. B. McDonald, Horace Wright.
- To prepare prize list for General Class, Messrs John Grady, Fulton Simpson, Theodore Ross.

Several recommendations were then made to the committee, principal of which was that 4 bushels should be asked for in the exhibit of Canadian

Seed Grower Association and in Standing Fields of Grain, two bushels in General Class; that as far as possible the prize list and ground exhibit be extended to six prizes: that first prize for McIntyre Potatoes be \$2.00, and for other varieties \$1.50.

The committees to superintend the various departments were not appointed but it was agreed that the prize list committee should meet in Summerside on December 30th to complete their work.

LIEUT W. J. CHEVERIE RETURNING HOME

The following letter has been received by Mrs. (Lieut.) W. J. Cheverie, Souris, from her husband, one of the officers of the permanent force, who was attached to the No. 2 Siege Battery which left a few weeks ago for overseas service.

Roffey, Camp, Horsham, Sussex, England, Dec. 6, 1915.

My Dear Ethel:—I promised you

that I would cable as soon as I arrived, but Col. Peake arranged to cable Major Bartlett who was to notify all papers and all relatives, so you are no doubt already aware of our safe arrival.

We sailed from Halifax on the Red Star Liner "S. S. Lapland" and arrived at Plymouth at about 10 a. m. Sunday. We then disembarked at about 2.20 and took the train for here where we arrived about 10 p. m. the same night.

Nothing eventful occurred during our trip only that on Saturday night before making land, everyone had to put on life belts and sleep on deck alongside of the life boats and life rafts, in case of an attack by submarines, but everything was clear and nothing doing. However it was very rotten on deck, raining quite heavily and all I had to sleep on was a cork mat and over me my overcoat, because I had to carry my revolver load in case of any panic, and if I had my great coat on, I would not be able to get it. Louis Pougere was on the next raft to mine.

We will be here at least two months and after that we go to Lydd, where we have a practice camp, the same as

when the Mahone fellows used to fire at York.

God bless the dear kiddies, yourself mother and all and hoping to hear from you soon I remain

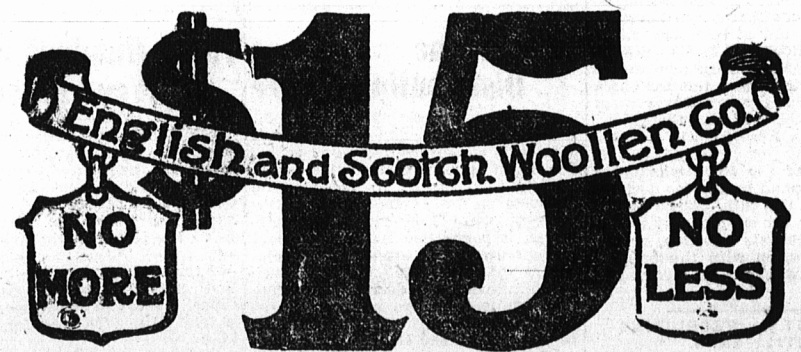
