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A Rose by any Other Name—



As the poet said—"Would smell as sweet." In the same way a Hermit by any other name would taste as good. For Hermits, made according to the following recipe, are just the things for the social tea-table.

- 1 cup butter
- 1 1/2 cups sugar
- 3 eggs
- 1 cup raisins stoned and chopped
- 1 teaspoon each of allspice, cinnamon and nutmeg
- 2 cups flour
- 2 teaspoons Magic Baking Powder

(If too dry and liquid is required, add a little cold water)  
 Cream together thoroughly butter and sugar, then with a wooden spoon work in raisins and spices, then the well beaten eggs, then flour and baking powder which have been sifted together, roll out and cut with very small cutter. Bake in moderate oven about 10 minutes.

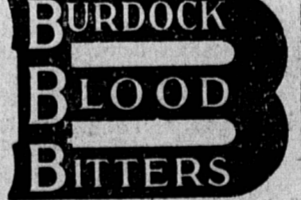
