McKay of Reserve was the first witness and testified to the effects of the shot. In his opinion death was caused by the first shot. John McNeill was the next witness and he was still on the stand at noon. John McIntyre and Daniel McIntosh were to be the next witnesses and it is expected that the case will be given to the jury early in the afternoon. The Sylvester woman's case will likely be taken up during the afternoon.—Glance Bay Exe.

**NE TEMERE DECREE WITHOUT LEGAL VALUE.**

MONTREAL, Feb. 26—The decision of Judge Charbonneau in the Hebert-Cloutre case declares:—

1—The "ne temere" decree is of absolutely no force in the Province of Quebec as far as the legal aspect of marriage goes. The "ne temere" is a religious decree only, and its influence is confined to spiritual matters only, and in no way has any effect on the legality of marriage.

2—The marriage performed by Rev. Wm. Timberlake, Methodist clergyman, between Emma Marie Cloutre and Eugene Hebert, on July 14th, 1908, is now and has always been perfectly valid.

3—No matter what the religious persuasions of the contracting parties are, any duly authorized clergyman can perform marriages which are perfectly legal in the eyes of the law of the Province of Quebec.

4—The annulment of the Hebert-Cloutre marriage by the Roman Catholic authorities of Montreal on November 12, 1909, is of absolutely no effect as far as the legality of the marriage is concerned.

5—Mr. Justice Laurendeau erred when on March 23, 1911, he gave civil effect to the annulment of the marriage done by the Roman Catholic authorities.

**NEW WORLD'S RECORD FOR BOWLING.**

TORONTO, Feb. 26—The sixth annual Canadian Bowling Association tournament finished on Saturday night when Jimmy Smith, Buffalo, the world's premier trundler, broke the world's record at singles in all events. Smith was in rare form and gathered 771 for three games beating the world's record of 705 held by Tom Haley of Detroit and Tony of Brooklyn. Smith also broke the world's record for all events, getting 941 in team, 648 in doubles, 771 in singles, a total of 2,660, giving an average of 228.89 for nine games. The former record of 1,961, was held by Tom Haley, Detroit.
