### Charges Nazis

but against the United States itself. The plan to abolish all religions—Protestant, Catholic, Mohammedan, Hindu, Buddhist and Jewish alike—would be imposed on a Nazi-dominated world if Hitler won. Mr. Roosevelt declared.

An international Nazi church would be substituted and the words of Hitler's "Mein Kampf" would replace the Bible.

"The god of blood and iron," Mr. Roosevelt asserted, "will take the place of the god of love and mercy."

The President went back over a bit of recent history since he proclaimed five months ago tonight the existence of a state of unlimited emergency. He recalled the sinking of American-owned merchant ships, the attack on the American destroyer Greer on Sept. 4, and the torpedoing of the destroyer Kearny on Oct. 17.

Shooting Has Started

"We have wished to avoid shooting," the president said, "but shooting has started. And history has recorded who fired the first shot. In the long run, however, all that will matter is who fired the last shot."

"America has been attacked. The U. S. S. Kearny is not just a navy ship. She belongs to every man, woman, and child in this nation."

"Hitler's torpedo was directed at every American, whether he lives on our sea coasts or in the innermost part of the nation, far from the seas and far from the guns and tanks of the marching hordes of would-be conquerors of the world."

"The purpose of Hitler's attack was to frighten the American people off the high seas—to force us to make a trembling retreat. This is not the plan of the Axis. They judged the American spirit. That spirit is now aroused."

The President remarked that if American policy were to be joined to the rest of the world, all our ships and all those of our sister republics would have to be tied up in home harbors and our navy remain abjectly behind the Hitler-declared "natural" barrier of the sea.

Proclaiming that freedom of the seas is and always has been a fundamental policy of the United States government, Mr. Roosevelt declared that "naturally" he has met that absurd and insulting suggestion.

Bluntly, Mr. Roosevelt declared that the forward march of Hitlerism could and would be stopped.

Pledged to Pull Our Oar

"Very simply and very bluntly," he added, "I am pledged to pull our own oar in the destruction of Hitlerism."

He said that each passing day brought a greater arms production for war than the actual battle fronts. And it is the nation's will, he added, that these vital arms and supplies shall not be locked in American harbors nor sent to the bottom of the ocean.

"It is the nation's will," the President added, "that America shall deliver the goods. In open defiance of that will, our ships have been sunk and our sailors have been killed."

"I say that we do not propose to take this lying down. Our determination not to take it lying down has been expressed in the orders to the American Navy to shoot on sight. Those orders stand."

Mr. Roosevelt made but a single and indirect reference to defence strikes, mentioning no dispute specifically nor any individuals by name.

The reference was in one brief paragraph which followed a declaration that defence output must be multiplied. He said—

"It can not be hampered by the selfish obstruction of a small but dangerous minority of industrial managers who hold out for extra profits, or for business as usual. It can not be hampered by the selfish obstruction of a small but dangerous minority of labor leaders who are a menace to the true cause of labor itself, as well as to the nation as a whole."

While Mr. Roosevelt spoke, the United States fleet was observing Navy Day in gala celebrations in port or on duty at sea.

The President kept himself in virtual seclusion throughout the day to complete the final draft of the speech. Speaking at the same dinner were Gen. George C. Marshall, chief of staff of the army, and Rear Admiral Emory S. Land, maritime commission chairman.

In Washington and at some naval shore stations elsewhere throughout the country, the public was let in on exhibitions of naval skill and activity on the day set aside to salute the ships and men forming the nation's outermost line of defence.

But navy yards, where men of war are being built or repaired, were kept locked.

Fleet units, particularly those along the submarine-infested North Atlantic sea lanes, were in full battle array, with ammunition, torpedoes and depth charges ready for instant use. On either coast, warships took on a more peaceful air with pennants strung from forecastle and "fantail" to mastsheads. Like the navy yards, however, they were not receiving visitors.

Roosevelt issues Navy day appeal

WASHINGTON, Oct. 26—(AP)—A call for all Americans to sacrifice their personal, sectional and group interests "in order that we may remain united and unconquered" was issued by President Roosevelt tonight in a letter ushering in the United States' celebration of navy day tomorrow.

Addressed to Secretary Frank Knox, the letter was made public by the Navy Department, which, in co-operation with the unofficial navy league, had arranged for naval shore establishments to observe navy day with suitable demonstrations.
