He has lost the sight of his right eye and has a wound in the left leg and in the wrist. He served in Holland in the same unit as Lieut. Roy Stillman of Summerside and was later killed in action. On completion of his leave he will return to hospital for further treatment. 1-13-21

School Improvement League Meeting

The School Improvement League held its first meeting of the new year on Thursday night at the home of the president, Mrs. Gordon McDonald.

The minutes of the previous meeting and treasurer's report were followed by a short business session.

Mrs. Aray reported that the rummage sale had been quite successful and it was decided to hold another early in February.

There was considerable discussion of the need of music instruction in the city schools and the method used in other Maritime centres to meet this need. Special reference was made to the recent addition of a music teacher to the St. Paul's school.

Mr. Keith Rogers was always keenly interested in any movement for the betterment of community life, especially in the field of education.

Mr. Rogers spoke of the part being played by radio in the schools of Canada at the present time and the greater contribution it will undoubtedly make to education in the future.

For the benefit of the school children of the Edward Island, radio station CFCY carries each day CBC school broadcasts each day during school hours. These are prepared by leading educationalists and presented in a most interesting and thought-provoking manner. Although these programs are widely used to supplement the regular school course in the parts of the Maritimes, Prince Edward Island has more than a half dozen classrooms equipped with radio.

At the close of his talk the president thanked Mr. Rogers on behalf of the meeting.

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The regular meeting of Hillsboro Chapter I. O. D. E. was held in the chapter rooms on Monday evening.

The meeting opened with the chapter prayer read by the members and the minutes of last meeting were read and approved.

The treasurer's report showed the chapter in a financial standing. Mrs. A. James Haslam reported on the Christmas box sale for the benefit of the Red Cross and informed the members an acknowledgement had been received.

Various letters from the "San" patients were read thanking the members for their remembering those patients at Christmas time.

The convener of the tea and fancy sale, held in December, reported the proceeds to amount to \$123.55.

A nominating committee was chosen with Mrs. W. Hunter as chairman to bring in a slate of officers for 1945.

Mrs. J. A. MacMillan and Mrs. E. D. Saunders from the Royal Edward Chapter gave interesting talks on the books-for-the-forced campaign whose object is to raise \$300,000 to buy books for the libraries of service men at home and overseas.

The meeting closed with the National Anthem, Dainty refreshments were then served. Mrs. W. McNeill and Mrs. E. M. Phillips were the hostesses.

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IN MEMORIAM

The people of Kinkora and surrounding districts were saddened on Nov. 12th when it was announced that Pte. George Preston Smith, third eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. William Smith, had been officially reported killed in Holland on Nov. 12th. Preston, who had just passed his 21st birthday, was a boy of sterling character and habits, a general favorite with both old and young in the community. He had a keen sense of humor and seemed to have the faculty of spreading happiness wherever he went. He went overseas in April 1944 and had been serving in France from July. He leaves his sorrowing parents, two sons and eight brothers. The following are extracts from letters received by the family from the Major commanding "D" Company, of the North Shore (N.B.) Regiment and from the Chaplain of that Unit:

26 Nov. 1944. "D" Coy. North Shore (N.B.) Regt., Can. Army Overseas. "I wish to extend my deepest sympathy to you in regards the death of your son Pte. Smith. G. I feel that I knew him the best of anyone in the Regiment, as he was my personal runner and was constantly at my side since he arrived at the battle front. His sudden death bothered me, and I still look around to find him. As I regarded him as a younger brother, he was absolutely fearless, and many a hard spot we struggled through together and laughed at my expense. He was at my side in every battle the Regiment took part in from the time we crossed the river in July until his death at Nijmegen a few weeks ago. Words rather fail me. I'd like to be able to talk to you and tell you about his fighting career—from the time we dug his first slit trench together under enemy fire—to when he died in my arms many months later, and, if the Good Lord spares me to come back, I'll certainly be coming home to see him!"

We miss Smithy—the whole Coy. does—especially the older ones who have been fighting for several months, as he was an old soldier.

He was hit by a 9 mm bullet (machine gun) in the chest, and he died almost instantly. I was standing about three feet away, and he dropped to my feet. But when time I got him turned over to find the wound, he was too far gone to even recognize me. I missed him talking to Father Hickey, and he will write you with regard to your son's burial. I will help somewhat, as it's hard to put on paper what you feel!"

North Shore (N.B.) Regt., C. O. "D" Coy. Dec. 2, 1944. "I am rather late in extending my sympathy to you on the death of your son, but I feel that you are in good circumstances over here. However, I have a great consolation for you. I had Mass for him and his mother, and your son was there and received Holy Communion. Your boy was struck by a bullet on the chest on Nov. 12th, although the Regimental Doctor was on the spot, nothing could be done, and his son died in about ten minutes. I buried him on Nov. 14th in the burial ground of the Catholic Church at Malden, Holland, and the fact has been entered in the church records. I remember your son in my Mass and prayers each day and shall continue to do so."
