MONTREAL, July 17.—(CP)—Possibility of a strike by the workers of the Dominion's two big rail lines—the Canadian National and the Canadian Pacific—has been revived today by the negotiating committee of the railway union, of which F. H. Hall is chairman, that steps had been initiated looking to the taking of a strike ballot. The committee charged that the action followed refusal of the companies to accept the unanimous findings of a conciliation board which recommended a sliding scale of vacations with pay.

700 Drowned In Ship Sinking Near Bombay

Big Bombers Will Carry Fighter Planes

Synopsis:
The spell of hot weather over the eastern part of the continent continued Thursday. Temperatures were well over 100 in Texas while in New England the thermometer registered 80 degrees in many places. The highest temperature reported from New Brunswick was 90 degrees at Campbellton, 83 was registered at Summerside, and 88 at Sydney. Even along the coast temperatures were near 70. The weather was mostly fine inland although there were a few showers. Fog continued on the sea and drifted inshore at night. On Friday similar conditions are expected.

Prince Edward Island: Clear becoming cloudy and continuing warm on Friday. Winds light during the night increasing after dawn to southwest 15. High Friday at Charlottetown 85.
