A meeting of the Board of Health was held in the City Building yesterday morning. Present, Mayor Warburton, Chairman of the Board; Couns. Crabbe, Nicholson, Lyons, Wheatley, Horne, Hooper and Taylor, Messrs. McGregor and Halloran, Water Commissioners, and Dr. Johnson, Health Officer, were also present. His Worship the Mayor explained that he had called a meeting of the Board of Health owing to a letter he had received from Dr. McLeod, Health Officer for Royalty East, Monday. The letter stated that there were cases of diphtheria in St. Dunstan's College, and also that some of the students had left the College. The Mayor, therefore, considered it his duty to call this meeting of the Board of Health to consider the situation and take steps to prevent the spread of the disease. It was decided to notify the Rector of St. Dunstan's that he was requested to keep the inmates of that institution on the premises while the College was under quarantine. According to the bye-laws an inmate coming into the city was liable to arrest. The Health Officer was also to notify any of the students who had left that they were to return to the College at once. Otherwise the places they were staying at would also be placed under quarantine.

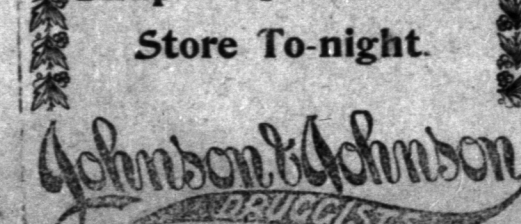
