SPEAKING of the two books "Essays on Puritanism" and "The Vine of Silmah," Cinema says: "The essays commended themselves at once to the discerning. The Spectator declared that they showed the qualities of 'acuteness and sanity, a depth, in appreciation of the subjects, they were all which one could wish.' The Glasgow Herald was among the first to discover that 'essays were not only remarkably interesting, but distinctly able; full of shrewd insight, strewn with sparkling sallies, thoroughly informed, as well as appreciative.' The London Examiner ranked them with Professor Dowden's Essay on 'Puritanism and Literature.' In the United States their reception was equally cordial. When a book is so worthy of comment was followed, within a few months, by another which, in a different way, was equally remarkable, people began to enquire who was this new author who bore the name of 'Andrew Macphail.' It was not hard to discover that this was really his name, that he had practised medicine in Montreal for fifteen years. Dr. Macphail was born in Prince Edward Island, which was at the time a Crown Colony, and was governed with some grandeur, traces of which yet remain. His progenitors for two hundred years had occupied their own lands in Lunenburg, where the head of the family was known as 'Invernalne'; and his grandfather 'came out' from King's College, Aberdeen, at the time of the 'D'ruption.' He was bound for Montreal, but had the good fortune to be cast away on the shores of Prince Edward Island, and there he remained. The sum total of his equipment, saved from the shipwreck for beginning life in a new world, was a spinning-wheel and a copy of 'Horace.' With these humble appliances he made the beginning of a home and opened a Latin School. There had been a tradition of scholarship in the family; and this pioneer, and all his family—three sons and four daughters—spent their lives in the course of education, an ignominious end of a tincture of learning, which has not been removed to this day. Of the present author's nine brothers and sisters, seven are University graduates. In 1851 Andrew Macphail entered the Faculty of Arts of McGill University, Montreal, and emerged thence seven years later as Bachelor of Arts, and doctor of Medicine. The two courses ordinarily occupied eight years; but by a plan devised by himself he managed to save a year. Also, by devices known only to himself, and to the editors of American newspapers, he managed to live off the country all those years, and on the day of final graduation he had a considerable sum to his credit. His last 'lifting' was a prize of two hundred and fifty dollars for an essay which was written during the stress of examinations. In defence of Vivisection.

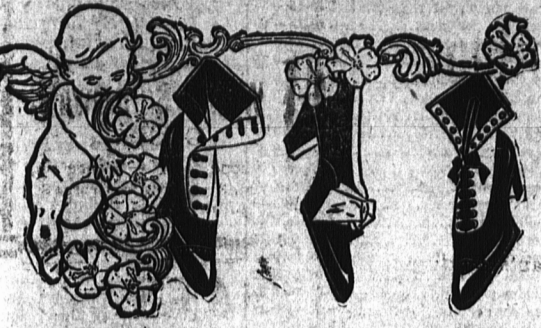

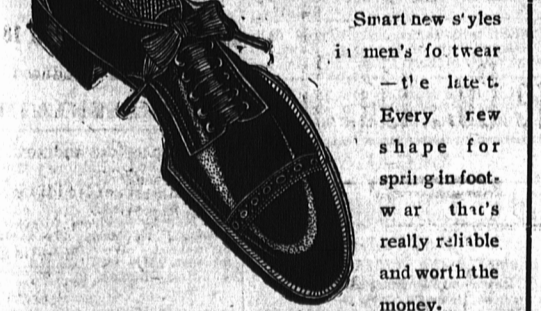
