Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

THE sole head of a family or any one over eighteen years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

WHAT THE JAPANESE LIVE ON

Dr. Takata, Japanese Minister of Education, has recently published a book concerning economic conditions in Japan. The pinch comes hardest upon the middle classes—than upon the lower classes, since the former must not only keep up a respectable appearance on salaries no greater than those that mean who work at trades receive.

For example according to Dr. Takata a primary school teacher earns fifteen dollars and a half a month, but his lowest budget for a family of four reaches seventeen dollars and thirty-three cents. His wife must do work at home to earn the deficit. A magazine editor and writer must keep up a respectable appearance on salaries no greater than those that mean who work at trades receive.
