"Salvage Sallies" Aid War Effort In Old Country

LONDON, July 24-(CP)-A rag, a bone or an old tin can-all are demanded for Britain's mighty war effort. The country is borrowing a leaf from the dictators' system of economic self-sufficiency. Here, however, the campaign against waste by saving and salvaging is not dictated by poverty of resources. Britain wants to produce as much food and recover every bit of scrap so valuable for essential war material and foreign exchange be conserved to buy it.

In this country, you don't toss away that silver paper from a pack of cigarettes. The old iron sink or bedstead in some dark basement corner has definite scrap value. A regiment of women, called "salvage sallies," has been recruited to tell the housewife what to save. The "dig for victory" campaign brought results in thousands of vacant lots turned into small gardens and now a "dig for victory" appeal to women appears destined for success. The higher the heels the greater the amount of wood and leather required. Timber is scarce now in wartime Britain and one timber tonnage of estimated 50,000 tons of wood a year are used for women's shoe heels.

Billboards everywhere are plastered with such signs as "let your shopping help our shipping" and "help win the war on the kitchen." The idea is for the housewife to cut down on purchases of imported goods and guard against waste. The ministry of food helps her periodically publishing advertisements for the desired purpose. An advertisement for potatoes notes they are home grown and adds "more potatoes mean less bread and fewer ships to bring wheat from overseas."

The ministry of supply has mobilized every one of the 10,000 parishes in Britain to provide scrap metal. The scrap includes tins and metal refuse ordinarily thrown into quarries or gravel pits. Boy Scouts, Girl Guides and Women's Institutes were enlisted in the effort. Money for disposal of the waste goes to the Red Cross agricultural committee.

Supply minister Herbert Morrison has received from an 89-year-old woman two heavy steel fenders and her treasured fire irons. One country church sent 10 tons of iron railings that used to surround it. Other trophies in the salvage drive include a six-ton gun from North Wales, three German guns from Esber, three from Arundel and a German tank from Portsmouth.

Students in Liverpool go from door to door as rag-and-bone merchants. Birmingham offers its garbagemen a bonus of one shilling three pence hundredweight for waste paper. Southampton, in North London, opened a "victory dump." In less than a year the amount of waste salvaged has increased five-fold.

News Briefs

LONDON, July 25-(CP)-The British air force, in repeated attacks against Germany and German-occupied countries, has made it "extremely difficult" for the Reich to organize mass attacks on Britain from existing airdromes and bases she "hoped to establish" just across the English Channel and the North Sea, an informed British source said today. More than 1,000 British attacks in the last three months have "to a great extent succeeded in breaking down the scheme Germany hoped would culminate in devastating attacks on these islands following her sweeping victories" on the continent, it was stated.

OTTAWA, July 25-(CP)-Of the 2,069 ships despatched from Halifax under supervision of the Royal Canadian Navy from the outbreak of war to July 1 last only 1,000 have been lost by enemy action, the Commons study group on naval affairs made known in its report published today. The ships lost carried goods.

WASHINGTON, July 25-(AP)-Government stoppage of oil shipments to Spain in American tankers, an authoritative federal source said today, indicates a virtual embargo against fuel or lubricant supplies which might reach Germany or Italy through an immediate stoppage became known officially when the Maritime Commission disclosed that a few days ago it had halted the sailing of two tankers, bound from Texas to Spain with 200,000 barrels of oil.

LONDON, July 25-(CP)-Hitler's conquest of the Low Countries has made it possible for Britain to take command of the world's diamond trade. These countries held a virtual monopoly on cutting diamonds for jewellery but now the industry is being rebuilt in Birmingham.

LONDON, July 25-(AP)-A press officer representing Gen. Charles De Gaulle, head of the French National Committee in Britain, announced today units of the "army of all free Frenchmen" are ready for service in Britain. "They include many of the toughest fighters in the world who have fought in the French Foreign Legion for more than 20 years," he said. Gen. De Gaulle has been recognized by the British Government as "leader of all free Frenchmen."

OTTAWA, July 25-(CP)-Young men who have been approved for enlistment in the Royal Canadian Air Force but are awaiting call, will still be called upon to undergo military training under the general scheme, Air Minister Power said today.

SAINT JOHN, N. B., July 25-(CP)-The Dominion Government has granted permission for persons of United Empire Loyalist descent and Mrs. W. S. McEachern, after their names in the national registration next month, according to information received by H. G. Markham, Saint John, from Capt. Van Wart, Toronto, of the Governor Sincece branch of the United Empire Loyalist Association of Canada. Mr. Markham is president of the New Brunswick Historical Society.

TORONTO, July 25-(CP)-The Monetary Times reported today fire loss in Canada for the week ended July 20 was \$149,940, compared with \$764,150 for the corresponding week of 1939. The cumulative total for Jan. 1 to July 20 was \$8,761,908, a slight decrease from the total of \$8,935,090 for the corresponding period of 1939.

LONDON, July 25-(CP Cable)-A threat of death, it was disclosed today, has been received in a Swastika labeled letter by Sylvia Pankhurst, leading suffragette in days long past and more recently a champion of independence for Ethiopia. The letter, which was handed to the police, pledged death for the slight little woman unless she abandoned the "New Times and Abyssinian News," which she edits in the hope of firing a spirit of revolution into the Ethiopians living under Italian rule.

MONTREAL, July 25-(CP)-Canadian steel production in the first six months of 1940 reached an all-time record, the Bank of Montreal's monthly business summary reported today. Production was 65 per cent greater than in the first half of 1939.

Speaking Of Hats

Men's hats are going sky-high this fall-speaking figuratively of course. For the latest thing in headgear for the male is a lightweight felt, named and designed after the most modern airplane development, the "Stratoliner." Boeing Aircraft in the United States are testing five new airliners which when completed will fly "above the weather," on a transcontinental hop, and simultaneously the John B. Stetson Company have introduced a "Stratoliner" model felt to tie-in with the latest development in air transport. The new hat is an exceptionally light model, ideal for general use as well as air travel. The idea for the new hat developed when the Stetson Company received a routine order from an American airline to design new perky caps for stewardesses; the Stetson Company thought of the passengers too.

Another new hat design which Stetson's have developed is known as "the Slant." This hat has a slant to the crown when in block shape and consequently gives a more rakish angle when the wearer "pork pie" it, telescope it or crease it! It has already caused a sensation in New York and Chicago.

Robertson, vice-president, Mrs. Lee MacDonald, secretary, Miss Lois MacDonald, chairman of the Knitting Committee, Mrs. W. S. McEachern; chairman of the Supplies Committee, Mrs. James McEachern. During the evening forty bandages were made which augurs well for the amount of war work these ladies will be able to accomplish in the future. Ice cream and cake was served by the hostess at the conclusion of the meeting. It was decided that the meetings be held every two weeks and Mrs. W. S. McEachern invited the ladies to her home for the next meeting.

The Red Cross received the entire proceeds of the festival held recently in Wood Islands sponsored by the Women's Institute. Mr. W. H. Brown brought \$68.50 to the Red Cross office from this entertainment to go towards war work.

CANADA BUYS PARACHUTES BUFFALO, N. Y., July 17-(AP)-The Canadian war supply board has placed orders for more than \$1,000,000 worth of parachutes and parts with the Irving Air Chute, Ltd., Canadian subsidiary President George Waite of the Irving Air Chute Company, Inc., said today.

Waite said the new orders are in addition to previous "substantial Canadian orders."
