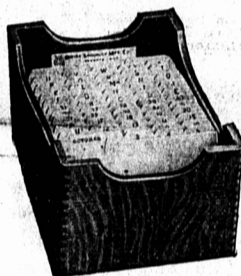

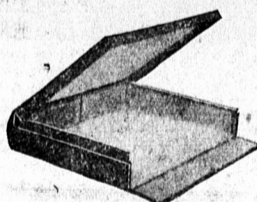

**THE SWANSEA TRADER**—The S. S. Swansea Trader sailed from Halifax Tuesday for Charlottetown and is due to arrive here tonight.

**PREPARING**—In preparation for the match to be played on Labor Day, Monday next, in Charlottetown between a team from Amherst and the representatives of the Phoenix C. C. of this city, the cricket ground at Victoria Park is receiving some needed attention. The heavy steam roller has been at work on it, levelling some bad spots, while some equally desirable mowing has been done. The field now presents a nice appearance and is in very good condition for play. The match promises to provide very interesting sport.

**NEW PASTOR APPOINTED**—Father D. P. Croken has been appointed parish priest of the parish of Georgetown and Montague. Father Croken after being ordained was appointed to the teaching staff of St. Dunstan's College, where he remained for over four years until last autumn, when he was appointed assistant to Mgr. Phelan at Vernon River. Father Croken is one of the most brilliant and popular young priests and during his short stay in Vernon River he made many friends. He is a worthy substitute for his late predecessor, the late Father S. T. Phelan.

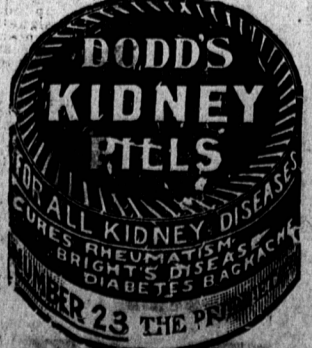
**FLORAL FESTIVAL**—In connection with the flower show which opens to-day under the auspices of the F. B. I. Floral Association, Professor Blair, Superintendent of Agricultural Experiment Station, yesterday performed the most judicious in the competition for the silver cup for the best kept lawn. It will be recalled that last week Messrs. Louison and Maszard conducted the preliminary judging and selected the twelve lawns from which the final decision was to be made. Yesterday Professor Blair inspected these twelve for the purpose of awarding the prize, but he has not yet decided as to the winning lawn.

**RAILWAY CHANGES**—The appointment of Mr. Huggan to the position of District Passenger Agent does not mean any considerable change in his duties. He will still be in charge of the local accountant department, but under the new arrangement by which P. E. Island is made a fifth district of the Intercolonial System, the principal accounting work will be carried on at Moncton for which purpose Messrs. E. R. Bell and Horace Rowe have been transferred to headquarters. Recently as the result of the representation of four different unions, wages have been increased here from 10 to 12 per cent., so that the amount of money paid in salaries and wages here is greater than formerly.

**FARMERS' PICNIC**—Yesterday, the members of the Northern Farmers' Institute, comprising the farmers of New Glasgow, Rustico and Mayfield, and of the Fredericton Institute, consisting of Fredericton, Springfield and Bradalbane, had their picnic to the Experimental Station. There were about a hundred of them altogether, and the majority came in from their farms on both the morning and mid-day trains, while the others drove to the Station in their private conveyances. They were arriving at the farm up to two o'clock in the afternoon. The usual itinerary in the inspection of the Station was carried out under the conduct of Mr. Clark, and afterwards the visitors were addressed by Professor Ross, Secretary of Agriculture, Mr. T. A. Benson, Poultry Expert, and Mr. H. Mitchell, Dominion Dairy Instructor. The usual votes of thanks were passed.

**TO REBUILD MILL**—Work has been commenced on the reconstruction of the wood working factory and lumber mill of Mr. M. P. Hogan, Charlottetown, which was recently destroyed by fire. The building will be built on the same foundation, which was not damaged by the conflagration, and will be slightly larger than the former structure. The dimensions of the new building are seventy feet long by forty feet wide and will be two storeys high. As a preventive against another fire a brick and stone wall will be built at the rear of the mill, which will enclose the boiler and furnace, shutting it off from the main building. Most of the machinery was not damaged and can be used again with the exception of the belting and some minor details. Mr. Hogan intends to improve upon the old plant with several new innovations and will make his plant one of the best on the Island. It is expected that the building will be completed and business resumed and running by October.

**LEAVES MONTREAL**—The S. S. Cascapedia of the Quebec Steamship Line, leaves Montreal today at 4 o'clock for Charlottetown and is due to arrive here Monday night.

**THE ELECTRIC LIGHT BARGAIN**—If the city Council do not acquire the Charlottetown Electric Light & Power Co's business it will be a public scandal. The whole concern which is making a profit of about 20 per cent can be obtained for \$84,000, and in copper wires alone, there is \$50,000. The capital of the company is \$55,000, and with shares at \$120 that means \$66,000 while there are bonds to the value of \$11,000. The plant is in excellent condition, and everything reads for further development if necessary. It is felt it would be a mistake to allow an outside private company to come in and obtain a footing.

**ENJOYABLE AFFAIR**—The League of the Cross Band turned out last night eighteen strong, to give a concert on the veranda of St. Anthony's Villa, to the Louship business of O'Leary. The following was the program: Royal waltzes, march, in a rose garden, waltz; national pride, march; sweet masses, waltz; make you home again, waltz; Thine alone, waltz and Victor, march. Despite the disagreeable weather a goodly number gathered in front of the villa to listen to one of the best programs of band music ever rendered in Charlottetown. The League of the Cross Band since its re-organization a few years ago has improved with leaps and bounds under the capable leadership of Mr. William Brawders, until the present time, when it is second to none on Prince Edward Island. The music discoursed, by the band last night eclipsed that of any yet played by them. After the concert on invitation of His Lordship, the members of the band repaired to the dining hall of the Villa where delightful refreshments were partaken of and also smokes were passed round. His Lordship then thanked the boys for their thoughtful action and assured them that they would have his assistance in anything they would undertake. The boys returned home greatly encouraged by His Lordship's kind words and filled with greater enthusiasm to carry on their noblest of works, that of Temperance.

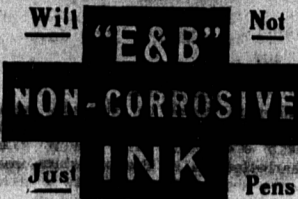
### NEW FOX RANCH

Mr. J. E. Newson, treasurer of the Massachusetts Silver Black Fox Company, leaves tomorrow morning for Boston, Mass. He has been on the Island for the past three weeks completing preparations for the opening of the Massachusetts ranch. This ranch is situated on the Mt. Edward Road, about two miles from town and is said to be one of the finest in the world. It is very commodious, occupying over five acres and having completed thirty pens with a capacity for forty. The pens are unusually large being nearly as large again as the ordinary pens, the idea being to give the foxes lots of room to exercise. They are fitted with new houses for the foxes containing a new idea in the way of ventilators which is said to keep a pure current of air through them at all times. There is plenty of natural foliage in the ranch, three varieties of wood being contained thereon. The outer fencing is of wire instead of board, thus permitting a free access of air and leaving the ranch cool even on the hottest days.

The keeper's house is a very handsome little cottage containing seven rooms, is nicely finished in every particular, and will be occupied by the Superintendent, J. C. McKendrick and family.

The ranch is being installed with a patent alarm system and, as further prevention against theft, has two bloodhounds and a foxhound. Every appointment in connection with the ranch is the most modern and convenient. An ice-house is being built with cold storage for meat, so that there will be no danger of any tainted meat in the line of food stuff being fed to the foxes. Connections are being made with the Charlottetown Electric Light Company and all of the pens will be under switch, which can be operated from the house or from the pens direct, so that in case of sickness or any alarm in the ranch the pens can be inspected very quickly. Telephone connects the Superintendent's house with the city so that the ranch is in communication with all points at all times. Mr. Newson was busy the past week taking delivery of the options he has bought in the various ranches. Three very beautiful pairs came from the Dalton Company and Mr. Newson is particularly enthused over these. He also has a pair from the Victoria ranch which are well liked.

perfect, and also three other options from various ranches which he says are equally good. During the first week in September the other foxes will be brought in and the stock will then be complete.

Numerous tourists from American points, who have heard of the ranch and are interested sentimentally because its head office is in Boston and a great deal of American capital has found its way into it, have been visitors to the ranch and will become investors judging by the enthusiasm they have shown. It certainly is a grand thing for the fox industry of this province, that men like Mr. J. E. Newson, who have made fortunes coming back to the home of their boyhood and investing in its enterprises. The fact that a company with such a large capital has been organized and the money subscribed in an American city within a few months, to carry on a business in this Province will give an added feeling of confidence to everyone who is connected with the fox business, and it is something that we can be proud of. It establishes almost a precedent of various others which we may expect should be the profit-making Company prove the profit-making which its promoters expect it to be. The Company's capital has not all been employed so far and they still have in the treasury a small quantity of unsold stock with sales of which they intend to add to their stock of foxes from time to time, so that by the beginning of the breeding season they will in all probability have from twenty to twenty-five pairs of foxes. Their options for 1914 have been applied for at \$12,000.00 and at that figure with a reasonable increase they should be in a position to net their shareholders somewhere between 60 per cent and 100 per cent. No more favorable proposition has been placed on the local market since the inception of the industry. It has been planned by business men with integrity and ability and every detail has been carefully and conscientiously worked out.

In Mr. J. C. McKendrick the Company is fortunate in possessing a man of untiring zeal and great natural ability. He has mastered the fox business from beginning to end and should prove a very successful rancher. He has as an assistant Mr. Gordon Webb who has had several years experience in the raising of foxes and seems to be able to get along with them in a markedly successful manner. Mr. Newson's many friends will be glad to learn that he will be returning within a few weeks, and it is their hope that now he has so much money invested here this Province will have the pleasure of visits from him very frequently. 1169-8-28 MB11.

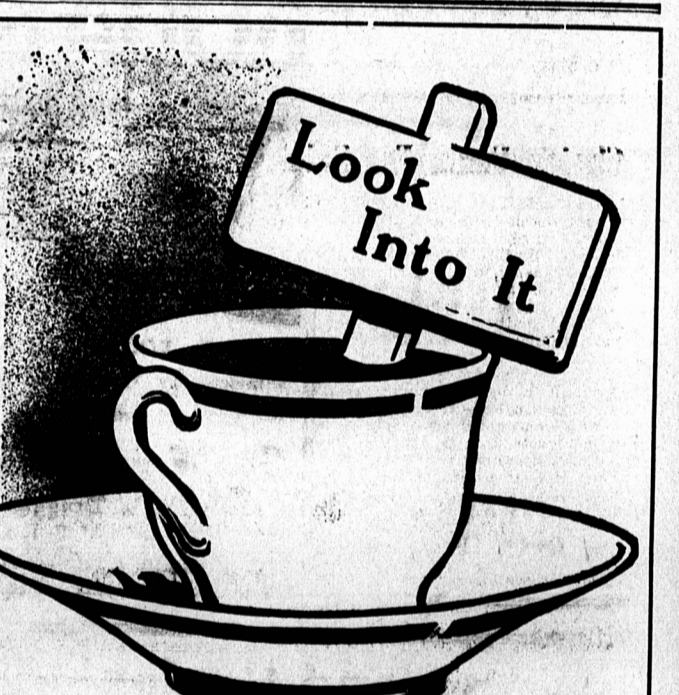
