(Received over Pitfield and Co's Private Wire) NEW YORK, Nov. 25—The London market further weakened, Paris sold heavily, American Petroleum Institute reports reduction of 914,000 barrels in gasoline inventories week ended November 21 to 56,670,000 barrels. Crude oil reported up 20,550 barrels. Domestically, except for maritime troubles, news continues favorable, but this cannot be said of news from abroad. It is very probable that the rally of yesterday may not carry through today although it is very likely there will be selective strength.

MONTREAL, Nov. 25—Canada Northern Power gross earnings October gained 1.9 per cent and net 0.8 per cent over same month a year ago. Ten months gross showed an increase of 2.9 per cent and net 2.5 per cent over correspond-

ing period last year. Newsprint exports: October expanded 21 per cent over same months ending October exports gained 20 per cent over same period last year. C. P. R. Traffic earnings week ending Nov. 21 increased 1.1 per cent over same week a year ago. C. N. R. gross revenues week Nov. 21 gained 11.7 per cent over same week a year ago. Butter was quoted at 25 to 25 3-8 cents per pound for carlots or less of No. 1 while lots to retailers were 26 1-2 for solids and 27 for prints.

Cheese averaged 13 1-4 cents per pound for Ontario while Quebecs were unquoted.
