

Fistic War Expected When McCloskey And Landry Tangle At Forum Tonight

Billy "Kid" Landry, claimant to the Maritime middleweight boxing title puts his crown on the line tonight at the Forum, when he tangles with "Bunny" Landry McCloskey in a ten-round battle that fans predict will be a real slugfest from start to finish.

Preparations have all been completed, seating plans on the big ice skating Forum have been gone over thoroughly and arrangements have been made to handle what is expected to be the biggest crowd ever to witness a boxing match here.

Both fighters arrived in the city Saturday. McCloskey with manager Lem Moore arrived by car in the afternoon with Landry and manager Cormier coming in by the evening train and both fighters are in the proverbial pink of condition.

Sharp as a razor we watched McCloskey going through light workout yesterday afternoon and the Island-born mitslinger impressed a good crowd of spectators with his speed, deadly punching and clever boxing ability. Bunny has had his eyes focused on the title for quite a while now and he has whipped himself into perfect condition for this, his first chance at the middleweight title. He would not commit himself in giving any prediction as to what the outcome would be but he is going out—and fast—from the opening bell to try and get it over with as quickly as possible.

Landry, a youngster of 23 years and a young overseas to his credit is a rugged-looking type of battler. A mixer at all times, he won the middle crown by beating Ferdina Smith in a brilliant ten-round battle, winning on a technical kayo in the tenth round, and since that time has come through with a victory over veteran Bill Sparks, a heavyweight fighter.

Carrying a terrific wallop in his right hand Landry hits pretty effectively with his left also. A good many of his victories have been won by the kayo route and he is said to be dynamic if an opponent leaves an opening for him.

So there you have it. A ten-round match between two hard-hitting middleweights neither of whom will back an inch but keep on coming forward all the time. With a pair like that inside the square, action is likely to explode once they come charging from their corners at the opening bell and it is not expected that the bout will go the limit. There is too much power contained in the fists of the two leather pushers.

The advance sale of tickets has been considered good by those likely that a rush will be staged today for the postcards. Additional ringside seats have been installed for the scrap and with every seat numbered ticket holders will experience little difficulty in finding their places.

In addition to the main event Chuck Ormon of Halifax and Beau Jack of Charlottetown clash in the semi-final. It is a return go between the pair who met here a week ago Saturday. On that occasion Ormon came through with a technical three round knockout but Beau is confident that he will be able to turn the tables tonight. It is listed for six rounds.

Cobey McCloskey and Lloyd Martin, a pair of heavy hitting youngsters tangle in a four rounder that should produce plenty of action. Both boys have met on a couple of occasions with honors about even, and tonight's mill should be action-filled all the way.

Sparks Gallant of Halifax, a newcomer to local ring circles tackles sharp punching Harry Paulton in the opening four-round preliminary and with Gallant rumored as a crowd pleasing type of fighter, this scrap should open up what promises to be an exceptionally crowd-pleasing card.

The first bout will get underway at 9 o'clock sharp with McCloskey and Landry expected to step under the glare of the ring lights about 10 p.m.

Tickets will be on sale all day today starting at 10 a.m. at the Forum.

Leafs Trounce Red Wings 6-3 To Go Into Tie With Canucks For League Lead

TORONTO, Oct. 20 (CP)—Toronto Maple Leafs provided a satisfying home-ice opening of the new National Hockey League season for 14,640 enthusiastic supporters last night. They trounced Detroit Red Wings 6-3 to move into a first-place tie with Montreal Canadiens in the league standing, and they fulfilled pre-season predictions as to their fighting qualities by leading the penalty parade.

Opening their 20th N.H.L. season, the Leafs roared into a 2-1 lead in the first period and then whipped home four more goals before they let off the pressure in the closing minutes when the Red Wings tallied twice.

The three Toronto forward lines shared equally in the victory, with two goals apiece Gus Bodnar and Bud Polle scored for the Flying Fords while line mates, Gabe Stewart, failed to get a point. Bill Ezinicki and Harry Watson scored for their line with their centre, Nick Metz, collecting an assist. Vic Lynn and scrappy Howie Meeker, both rookies, scored the only pair with centre T. Kennedy leading a helping hand.

Roy Conacher led in individual scoring with two Detroit goals. He had help both times from Billy Taylor, who went to the Red Wings in a pre-season trade for Watson.

Bruins Play Second Tie In As Many Games

BOSTON, Oct. 20 (AP)—Thanks to the sharpshooting of the Bentley brothers, Chicago Black Hawks gained a 2-2 tie with Boston Bruins as the latter opened their 23rd National Hockey League home season tonight before a sellout crowd of 13,900.

After a fast but scoreless opening period, Max Bentley put the Bruins into a 1-1 tie by rifling in a 30-foot shot after taking a pass from his brother Doug. That Chicago goal offset the 55-footer Bep Guidolin drove in for the Bruins about two minutes earlier in the second session. The Chicago counter, however, was made while the Bruins had a player in the penalty box.

During the first minute of third period action, the Bentleys put together another scoring play and Doug rapped in a close-up to give the Black Hawks a 2-1 lead.

But they were able to prove that margin for only about two minutes. Bill Cowley pulled the Bruins back on even terms by leading a thrumming charge from the centre zone and setting up Guidolin inside of the Chicago defence.

Guidolin slashed a vicious shot at Paul Bibeault and that goalie, who performed for the Bruins during the past two seasons, blocked with his chest. Cowley caught the puck in the air dropped it and poked it through the open side of the Chicago cage.

Rangers Win From Detroit Red Wings 3-1

DETROIT, Oct. 20 (AP)—Scoring two goals in the opening period and outskating Detroit all the way, New York Rangers won their first National Hockey League victory of the season here tonight, beating the Red Wings 3-1 before a standing room crowd of 15,567 fans.

The defeat, second straight for Detroit, left the Red Wings still looking for their initial victory of the year.

Grant Warwick, taking a neat pass from centre Edgar Laprade at the corner of the Detroit net, lifted a shot past Detroit goalie Harry Lumley's shoulder that put New York in front 1-0 after seven minutes of play while New York's left wing Tony Leswick was serving a high-sticking penalty.

Before the opening stanza was over Phil Watson sent a low stinging 20-foot shot sailing under Leswick's outstretched leg for New York's second goal.

Defenceman Jean Paul Lami, range of New York made it 3-0 after six minutes of the second period with a hard 5-foot angle shot and the Rangers coasted to their first victory over Detroit here in almost a year.

Detroit finally broke its scoring famine 11 minutes from the finish when centre Sid Abel shoved his own rebound under goalie Chuck Rayner.

Bruins And Canadiens Pick Up 1945 Feud By Battling To 1-all Draw

MONTREAL, Oct. 20 (CP)—Those old rivals from last year's Stanley Cup finals, Montreal Canadiens and Boston Bruins, battled to a 1-1 tie at the Forum here Saturday night as they picked up where they left off last spring.

A capacity crowd of nearly 13,000 saw both squads throw up tight defenses as they felt one another out for more than 45 minutes before either of those goal-stingy netminders, Bill Durnan or Frankie Brimsek, was beaten.

Bruins drew first blood at the 6:21 mark in the third period when Bill Ehill poked the rubber past "Vezna Bill" Durnan after a scramble in front of the nets that saw defenceman Jack Crawford and centre Milt Schmidt taking a head.

That looked like the game right there, the way Bruins were covering up and the way "Mr. Zero" Brimsek in their nets was kicking them out, but Canadiens kept up the pressure until it paid off.

The Blake, captain and veteran ice general of the Habitués, tied it up at the 17:30 mark when he shoved the puck behind Brimsek from a mad melee in front of the goal that climaxed a surging power play by last year's NHL champions and Stanley Cup holders.

Centre Elmer Lach and rushing defenceman Kenny Reardon drew assists on the play as they gangbanged the Boston net.

The game was cleanly fought and only four penalties were handed out. Big Babe Pratt, obtained by Boston from Toronto this year, drew two of them as he played a hard-bumping game. Kenny Mosdell and Kenny Reardon of Canadiens drew the others. Both goals were scored with the teams at full strength. The penalties didn't seem to matter, and in fact the short-handed side each time had a bit the better of the play as they turned the wick to thwart the attackers.
