Steel Operators Have Less Fear Of Strike

CLEVELAND, Jan. 19—(AP)—Steel operators have less fear of a strike in the industry this year than heretofore and are planning production schedules on the basis of uninterrupted output, the magazine Steel said today.

"In fact," the magazine asserted, "it is believed that most of them are selling on a quarterly basis will have (sales quota) allotments set up by Feb. 1 whether or not wage negotiations are completed by that time."

"Wage negotiations (scheduled to start today) always carry a threat of a strike until agreement is finally reached. Most steel producers regard this threat as less menacing than upon previous occasions and feel encouraged in going ahead with their plans for the second quarter."

"They feel that in any event that is the chance they will have to take, and if serious disruptions to production do develop they will make the necessary revisions in their quotas."

Steel reported that in some instances mills were hopeful of catching up with orders by the next quarter.

TO RECALL FOUNDING OF ORDER OF GARTER

WINDSOR, England, Jan. 19—(CP)—The 600th anniversary of the founding of the Order of the Garter will be celebrated here with pageantry and music in the spring of 1948.

The King has commanded Britain's poet laureate, Dr. John Masefield, to write a pageant play, and the master of the King's music, Sir Arnold Bax, is to compose its musical setting. The nave of St. George's Chapel, home of the order, will be the setting of the pageant. Knights of the order under the chairmanship of Bishop Hamilton, dean of Windsor, now are at work on the plans.

Market Leaders Finish Week On Upside At N. Y.

NEW YORK, Jan. 19—(AP)—Heavy early buying of stocks Saturday followed the restoration of margin trading and, despite subsequent profit cashing, market leaders finished a spotty week generally on the upside.

Activity was pronounced at Saturday's opening gains running to two or more points. The pace slowed after a lively 20 minutes and extreme advances were reduced in the majority of cases at the close. Ralls were exceptionally narrow.

The Associated Press 60-stock composite was up .5 of a point at 65.4 and for the week showed a net gain of 4.

Gainers on the day of a point or so were Allied Chemical at 173 3-4, Harbney at 45, American Can at 35, Philip Morris at 43, Goodrich at 1-4 and Douglas Aircraft 70. Fractionally ahead were U. S. Steel, General Motors, Chrysler, Sears Roebuck, Montgomery Ward, International Harvester, American Telephone, Consolidated Edison, Kennebec, General Electric, Southern Pacific, Chesapeake and Ohio and Standard Oil (NJ).

Canadian issues advanced fractionally at the close. McIntyre and Distillers Seagram rose 1-4, Hiram Walker gained 1-8, and Dome Mines up 3-8.

ACTRESS MUST FACE MANSLAUGHTER TRIAL

Film actress Helen Walker, recuperating in hospital from automobile crash injuries suffered New Year's night, has been ordered to appear in police court Jan. 21 for preliminary hearing on a manslaughter charge. Pte. Robert Lee of March Field was killed when Miss Walker's car, in which he was a passenger, overturned six times on a highway. Two other men in the car escaped serious injury.
