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Belmont Girl Killed In Auto Crash

LEXINGTON, Nov. 17—A 17-year-old Belmont High School girl was fatally injured, her male companion was hurt seriously and another man was slightly injured in a crash between two automobiles at Bedford and Hill streets in North Lexington, late this afternoon.

Miss Isabel Beaton, only child of Mr. and Mrs. Herbert A. Beaton, of 562 School St., Belmont, died at the Symmes Arlington Hospital, an hour after the accident. Robert P. Wilson, 10, of 19 1/2 Walnut St., Clinton, in whose light coupe Miss Beaton was riding, is in the Symmes Arlington Hospital, suffering from lacerations of the scalp, and abrasions and contusions about the leg.

Paul B. Weber, Jr., of Hillside Ave., Bedford, passenger in the other machine involved in the fatal mishap, was cut on the forehead. Weber's car was being driven by a chauffeur, Ole W. Rustad, 37, of Main St., Bedford. He escaped with a shaking.

After the death of Miss Beaton, Rustad was placed under arrest, charged with manslaughter and operating an automobile so that the lives and safety of the public might be endangered. He will be arraigned in the District Court at Concord tomorrow morning.

The cause of Miss Beaton's death was not determined this evening. According to her parents, Miss Beaton, who was graduated from Belmont High last June, and was taking a postgraduate course this year, was a former school friend of Wilson, who had come to Belmont this afternoon to visit her. They decided to take an automobile ride and it was while on this trip that the accident happened. Miss Beaton, who had many friends in Belmont, was a member of the Order of the Rainbow.

The impact caused Wilson's machine to turn over twice and land upside down. Wilson and Miss Beaton were thrown clear, landing a short distance from the car. Rustad's car crashed into a pole.
