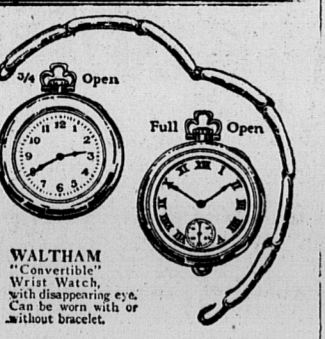

GIBBONS PREACHES ON WAR
Schemes of Lawless Ambition Doomed, the Cardinal Declares

BALTIMORE, Feb. 28.—The German war aims are due to fail, said Cardinal Gibbons this morning in a sermon at the Cathedral here. He discussed the "Marvellous Mission of the Primitive Christian Religion." A throng that filled the edifice listened to the Cardinal, who spoke with unusual vigor. When he declared that "the present world-wide war is a striking illustration" of the fact that "schemes conceived in passion and fomented by lawless ambition are doomed," he attacked with much fire. "My brethren," said the Cardinal, "imitate your forefathers in the faith of your unclouded belief in an immortal destiny. Imitate them by your rectitude of your lives and by your zeal for the honor of God and His Church. Imitate them, above all, by working miracles of grace and mercy, by your charity and compassion for the sufferings of your fellow-beings. Let us earnestly pray that our brave young soldiers who are now in the trenches, or who are preparing to go there, may be preserved in their faith and morals from the dangers which surround them, that they may heroically fulfill their glorious mission and that they may soon return triumphant to the bosom of their families and to their beloved Columbia, the mighty mother of us all."

I did not get those parcels that mother sent me, but I guess I will get them soon. I had a letter from cousin Josie yesterday, and she sent me her picture. She looks fine. Well, Jerry, I haven't much news for this time, so good-bye, and the best of love.

DIRECT COMMUNICATION INSTITUTED
OTTAWA, Feb. 27.—In order to facilitate the transaction of public business between the two countries, a direct wire connection has been established between the Canadian War Trade Board, Ottawa, and the Canadian War Mission, Washington. The inauguration of this direct service was marked by the following exchange of congratulatory telegrams between President Wilson and Sir Robert Borden:

"The White House, Washington.
"May I not send you this word of gratification that direct connection between Ottawa and Washington has been established by wire, and express the hope that this means of direct conversation will contribute still further to promote a good understanding and lasting friendship between Canada and the United States."

SHIPBUILDING IN CANADA

OTTAWA, Feb. 27.—Shipbuilding contracts placed in Canada by the Imperial Munitions Board since March 1, 1917, constitute the biggest year in ship construction this country has ever seen. Contracts have been let in the last 12 months for 46 wooden ships with a total tonnage of 128,000, representing \$24,500,000 and for 43 steel ships totalling 211,500 tons worth \$40,000,000 or a total value of \$64,500,000.

Four steel ships aggregating 13,900 tons the individual boats having a tonnage of 4,200, 3,400, 4,500 and 1,800 have been completed. Four wooden ships have already been launched and several others are ready to take the water. New yards were opened during the year at Welland, Vancouver and Toronto. All yards for the construction of wooden ships are new or have been added.

The value of the contracts let in the different provinces is as follows: Nova Scotia \$1,340,000; New Brunswick \$1,000,000; Quebec \$11,600,000; Ontario \$19,240,000; British Columbia \$21,434,000.

In British Columbia nine steel ships, each of 8,800 tons worth \$14,750,000; two of 4,600 tons worth \$1,679,000, and one of 4,500 tons, worth \$965,651, or a total of \$17,334,651, have been contracted for, along with 27 wooden ships, worth \$14,100,000.

In Ontario 25 steel ships were contracted for. These comprise 13 of 3,500 tons; 9 of 3,400 tons; 1 of 4,200 tons, and 2 of 2,900 tons, a total tonnage of 86,200 tons, representing \$17,240,000. In addition to this, four wooden ships, totalling 11,200 tons, worth \$2,000,000, have been contracted for.

In Quebec, four steel ships, of 7,000 tons each, valued at \$5,600,000, and 12 wooden ships of 2,800 tons worth \$8,000,000 representing a total value of \$11,600,000, have been contracted for.

GERMAN SUCCESSES

BERLIN, Via London, Feb. 26.—The German forces have occupied Revel after an engagement with the Russians. The Germans have also captured Pskov (about 160 miles southwest of Petrograd).

This announcement is made in the official report from general headquarters tonight. The text reads: "The town and fortress of Revel were occupied at 10.30 o'clock this morning after a battle. Pskov (Pskov), south of Lake Peipus, is in our hands. Revel, capital of the province of Estonia, is a fortified seaport on the Gulf of Finland about 230 miles west of Petrograd by rail. Prior to the outbreak of the war large numbers of its population of nearly 100,000 were Germans. The town did a large export business before the war, chiefly of grain, timber, furs, hides, wool and hemp, its aggregate trade averaging well about \$30,000,000 annually. The old imperial palace, built by Peter the Great still stands in the town, which also contains numerous other buildings of historic renown. The town of Pskov, in German known as Pleskov, is the capital of the Government of the same name. It has a Kremlin on a hill and a historic cathedral. The ruins of numerous rich and populous monasteries are still to be seen in or near the town. The business of Pskov is unimportant."
