Several of the large farmers in this vicinity find themselves left with from 500 to 2,000 barrels for which they, at one time, refused \$2 a barrel. It is needless to say that they are not greatly pleased over the situation. Some of the Boston potato houses, after ordering the potatoes, refused to accept them when they arrived, as the short lived potato boom had blown up.

Mr. George Reddin of Charlottetown requests The Guardian to state that he was opposed to the decision given in the third heat of the 2.30 pace, in which Moth Miller was set back from first to seventh position. ## THE WEATHER THE TEMPERATURE TIDE, MOON ETC

TORONTO, July 2.—Moderate northeasterly winds, fair and a little cooler.

THE WEATHER.—Yesterday morning was cloudy with heavy thunder and lightning followed by extreme heat; turning cold in the afternoon; very heavy rain at night; clearing towards morning.

The temperature at three o'clock this morning by the Rexall Store tested thermometer with a northern exposure was forty-nine degrees above zero and with a southern exposure was fifty-one degrees above. The highest temperature recorded yesterday was seventy-four degrees above zero and the lowest was fifty-three degrees above. The lowest the previous night was fifty-five degrees above. At nine a.m. it was sixty-six degrees above and at nine p.m. it was fifty-three degrees above.
