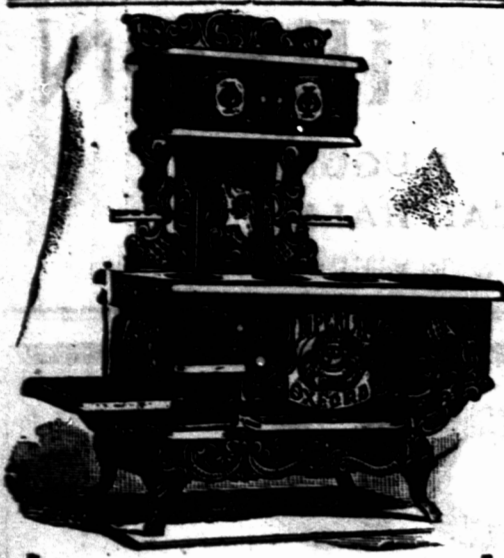

DEATH OF HON. MALCOLM MACDONALD.

We regret to record the death of Hon. Malcolm Macdonald of Georgetown, which sad event took place at an early hour last evening at the P. E. Island Hospital. He had gone there for treatment some weeks ago, and although his condition from the first was thought to be serious he rallied a week ago and his friends had hopes of his recovery. A relapse followed and the end came swiftly but peacefully. The sad event has cast a gloom over a large circle amongst whom he was known and respected, and aroused their heartfelt sympathy for the bereaved relations.

Captain Macdonald, as he was familiarly known, was born at Uigg, July 10, 1836, and was a son of the late Donald Macdonald and his wife Margaret Gordon both Highland Scotch. In early life he followed the sea and sailed to many distant countries. He afterwards settled down to mercantile business, first at Montague and later at Georgetown in partnership with the late John Westaway under the firm name of Macdonald & Westaway. He was induced to enter political life some years ago, and at the last provincial election in Cardigan District he was successful in defeating W. A. O. Morson a popular candidate there. In the same year he was appointed a member of the Executive Council which position he held until his demise. The deceased gentleman was President of the Liberal Association of King's County for many years, and also President of the Three Rivers Steamship Company.

Mrs. Macdonald, formerly Miss Snelgrave of this city and two children, Mrs. Richardson, wife of H. L. Richardson of the Bank of Nova Scotia at Toronto, and Harold Macdonald, now managing the business at Georgetown are the nearest relatives of the deceased. Rev. D. G. Macdonald, a Baptist minister, resident in this city in past years is a surviving brother. In the great loss which touches them so closely they have the sympathy of the entire community. The public loss will be felt severely in Georgetown, and throughout King's County and the Island. In his large business as well as in his social and political life the deceased gentleman was known as a man of the strictest probity and honor, and his removal creates a void which must long remain unfilled.
