RED CROSS APPEAL FOR MORE SUPPLIES

The emergency call to all Divisions of the Canadian Red Cross Society to speed up work and produce more clothing for refugees and hospital crutches and supplies, has found the women of Prince Edward Island rising to the occasion nobly. With generous solicitude to attend twenty women workers at the Red Cross work-rooms in Charlottetown on Tuesday and a group of nurses have been there every day during the week.

Due to the tremendous numbers of war casualties the need for hospital supplies—bedgowns, pajamas, surgical dressings as well as crutches for refugees is imperative. All Divisions were instructed to forward immediately supplies on hand—hospital and refugee—and, as a result, five crates have been despatched this week from this Province, making a total of 21 crates since the war began.

Stocks are being sent in with longer than regulations specify—14-18" is the required length from the top of the cuff to the bottom of the heel.

The Red Cross is urging everyone to sew empty tubes of all kinds—technique, slaving, team, machine, medicine, as they are very valuable for their content.

The appeal for woollen blankets should interest Prince Edward Island women whose homes are happy and peaceful, and the pitiful plight of the thousands of homeless women and children and wounded men who have fallen in the fight for our freedom, should be an incentive for us to work and give to the limit of our capacity.

Island Cadet Inspection On June 19-20

The inspection of Prince Edward Island Cadet Corps will take place next month when Capt. G. K. MacKay, General Staff Officer in charge of Cadets, Military District No. 6, will visit the Province. West Kent and Queen Square schools will be inspected June 19th, the former at 10 o'clock and the latter at 4 o'clock in the afternoon. The competition between these two city schools has always been keen and the records for the past five years shows that Queen Square has captured the honors three times and West Kent twice. The boys of both schools are drilling daily for the coming inspection under the capable guidance of their instructors. Mr. James McCallum is in charge of the Queen Square corps and Mr. Fred Hine the West Kent corps. Other cadet corps to be inspected are: Souris and Georgetown, June 19th and Summerside, June 20th. West Kent School captured Provincial honors and a Dominion Trophy in last year's competition. Prince of Wales College corps has already been inspected.

Bishop Nelligan Visits Queen Square School

The teachers and pupils of Queen Square assembled in the school auditorium at 9:30 yesterday morning to welcome a former teacher of the school, Col. Most Rev. G. L. Nelligan, Bishop of Pembroke, Ont., and now chief Catholic Chaplain of the Canadian Forces both in Canada and overseas. He was accompanied by Revs. Louis Doucette, Fr. Keeffe and Fr. McCormac of the Basilia Staff.

Bishop Nelligan was introduced by the Principal, Mr. J. W. F. McCallum. The pupils under the direction of Mr. A. P. Doucette rendered several appropriate choruses. Bishop Nelligan during the course of his remarks said he was always glad to visit the school where he had taught for several years, and also assisted Mr. Macdonald with the Cadet Corps. He was pleased to renew acquaintance with several of his former co-teachers and to make new acquaintances also.

He outlined the nature and extent of his duties as Chief Catholic Chaplain of the Canadian Forces. Lobster Industry Suffers Setbacks

Lobster fishermen were faced with growing difficulties this week, as the price of live lobsters in the United States fell off badly in recent days, cutting the price paid to Island fishermen in two.

At the same time this week has Wednesday, when the catch all around the Island's shores yesterday one of the largest fishing centres in the province reported there was not a boat with a catch of 100 pounds.

Until the present slump fishermen had been up to or even slightly ahead of last year in the quantity landed. Mr. J. J. Larabee, supervisor of fisheries for the province said yesterday. The catch had held up well generally, despite the fact that 20 per cent of the lobsters were under the six and a half inch limit and were put back into the sea. The north shore fishermen were affected more than those on the south shore of the Island by the size regulation, the Larabee said.

The first catches of cod for the season were reported this week. Yesterday catches at Souris, Alberton, Tignish and Rustico were all said to be good.

Nazi Submarines Resume Activities

VIGO, Spain, May 29—(AP)—German submarines lurking off Spain's northeast coast suddenly renewed their offensive against Allied shipping today, sinking one French merchantman and setting afire a British tanker with a probable loss of 40 of their crews of 87.

The French merchantman Marie Jose, 5,000 tons, was hit by a cluster of torpedoes and sunk.

The British tanker Telena, 7,400 tons, was set afire by submarine shellfire. Her crew dumped the oil load and abandoned the burning vessel. Trench fishermen were towing her to port. The attacks were so sudden the crew did not have time to man the guns.

Fishermen said they thought they saw two other submarines standing off at a distance.

The submarine attack was the first evidence of German activity in Atlantic shipping routes since the invasion of Norway and Denmark last April 9.

The scene of today's attack was near the Bay of Biscay and close to the route the United States and Washington will take when she sails tomorrow for Bordeaux, France, to remove Americans from the war zone.
