THE SITUATION IN RUSSIA IS ONLY TEMPORARY

NEW YORK, Nov. 27.—Confidence that the Maximist Government in Russia will be overthrown was expressed today by Count Ilya Tolstoy, the Russian author, in a message sent from San Francisco to the Evening Mail. "I am certain," Count Tolstoy telegraphed, "the present situation in Russia is only temporary. The Maximists will surely be overthrown. Separate peace cannot be made by this small group of traitors, not representative of Russia. I still have great faith in the Cossacks, headed by General Kaledines."

PUBLICATION OF STATE SECRETS

PETROGRAD, Nov. 29.—The Bolshevik government continued today the publication of secret documents printed today was a telegram from Sergius Sazonoff former minister, to the allied countries dealing with the efforts of Germany, Russia and Japan through the German embassy at Stockholm. In reply to Germany, M. Sazonoff is quoted as having said that he advised the Japanese ambassador that Russia was willing to listen to a peace proposal, providing the proposal was made to Russia, Great Britain, France and Japan in which event he would notify Italy which then was not in the alliance.

Another telegram, sent by the Russian ambassador at Rome, October 31, 1917, told of a desire of the Italians to have Russia make an attack against the Austro-Germans to relieve the pressure on Italy.

ITALIANS READY FOR A GREAT BATTLE

WASHINGTON, Nov. 28.—(Italian) Great activity among the Austro German Divisions all along the Italian front, and reported in official despatches from Rome received here today, are declared to forecast a still greater offensive in the Northern Sector, with elaborate preparations for mighty efforts to break through.

THEY ARE "OUR PEOPLE"

Deeds and sufferings such as these speak for themselves, and show us as no words can show the soul of our people. For they are our people—our "people in arms," as the Germans fondly believed this people would never stand. They so stand today at the behest of no "War Lord" but of their own free will 3,000,000 of them in the Expeditionary Force and 430,000 of them in the navy. That is how a free people rise to the call of a duty in a just war. On sea and land this great mass of British warriors, such as never before gathered beneath the flag have shown the same unswerving zeal for the national cause. Whether they come from the home counties, from the remotest provinces of the Dominions, from India, or from the smallest of the Colonies, the same spirit breathes in all.

ROCK OF GIBRALTAR

England has been in possession of the rocky promontory of Gibraltar since 1704. From that time to this it has been a crown colony under the administration of a governor. By reason of its important strategic position it is called the "key to the Mediterranean."

Gibraltar has had a stormy history in 711 the rock was taken by the Arab chief Tarik, who called it 'Tebel-al-Tarik (Hill of Tarik) and built a fortress on the promontory. Part of these ruins is still extant. In 1309 it was taken by the Castilians, only to be recaptured by the Moors in 1333. It was held by them until 1462. Following the taking and sacking of Gibraltar in 1540 by Barbarossa extensive military works were built there by order of Charles V.

In 1704 the promontory was captured by a combined force under Sir George Rooke and the Prince of Heise-Darmstadt, fighting for the arch-duke Charles of Austria. The moment it fell into their hands the British admiral threw off the alliance with the Austrians and took complete possession of the works.

British possession since that time has been unbroken, although it was under a Spanish siege for nearly three years and eight months.

CANADIANS IN TANKS

LONDON, Nov. 27.—The Associated Press has received the following telegram from France: "Canada will be intensely interested in the splendidly successful attack on the River Scarpe. The credit of the victory goes to General Byng, the Canadians former Commander. With him are some Dominion Staff officers who elected to go with him when he left the Canadians. One unit was led by a Canadian officer, who since the Passchendaele battle, joined Byng's splendid army. The tanks which broke through the German defences have hundreds of adventurous young Canadians. This service is becoming as popular with the Dominion troops as the Flying Corps."

ALLIES WILL IGNORE NOTE OF THE BOLSHEVIKI

LONDON, Nov. 27.—The Times' Petrograd correspondent says he has learned from an authentic source that there was a meeting of the foreign ambassadors at the American Embassy Friday night, at which it was decided to ignore the note of Leon Trotsky, the Bolshevik Foreign Minister, demanding an armistice. It was decided, the correspondent adds, to treat the note as if it had not been received.

PETROGRAD, Nov. 27.—A congress of the second army, with one dissenting vote, has passed a resolution approving all the measures promulgated by the Council of National Commissioners, including the decree for an immediate armistice and peace favoring the government of the "Workmen's and Soldiers' Delegates." The resolution appeals to all soldiers not to support Premier Kerensky and the provisional government generals, against the people. The most striking passage in the resolution follows:

"The Second Army, with arms in its hands, will defend the authority of the Workmen's and Soldiers' delegates and the National Commission. At the first order of the Military Revolutionary Committee of the Second Army which is clothed with full power, we will advance as one man against counter-revolutionists in the rear as well as at the front. "On our part we are taking all measures for the removal of counter-revolutionary elements from the commanding personnel of the army, for the immediate democratization of the army and in particular for the transfer of the higher authority in the army to elective bodies."

THE METHODIST CLERGY ENDORSE THE UNION GOVT

ST. JOHN, Nov. 28.—Gathered together from all the Methodist churches of St. John, of Welsford, Jerusalem, Kingston, Westfield, Hampton, Newton, Sussex, Apohaqui, St. Martin, the appointed delegates engaged in the work of the regular quarterly meeting at Centenary church, yesterday.

Rev. L. H. Jewett and Rev. Jabez Rice, because of ill health could not attend and were excused. Amongst communications was a strong letter from Rev. C. Flemington, treasurer of the sustentation fund, in response to which the meeting unanimously resolved that an honest effort should be made on every circuit to fully measure up to the respective appointments.

Reporting progress on the recent missionary campaign each charge was declared to have responded in splendid fashion. The goal of \$2,500 appears within reach.

Service," was treated bravely by Rev. J. P. Rowley of Hampton. Practical consideration led to the following resolution:

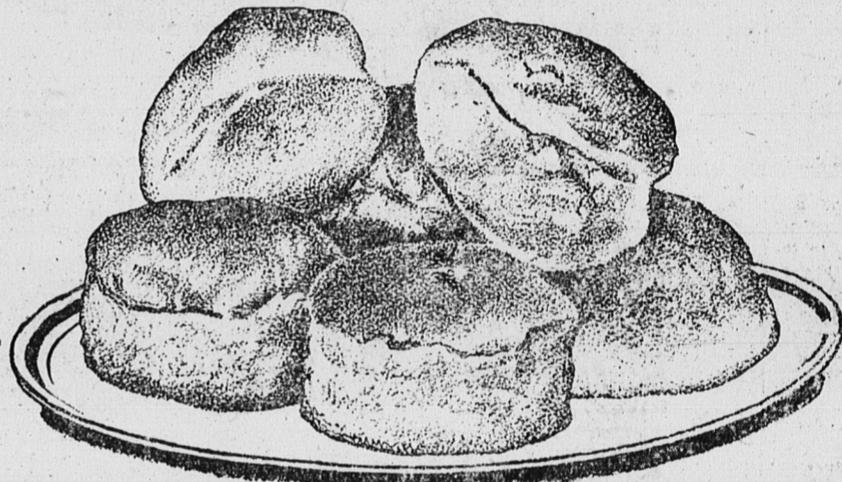

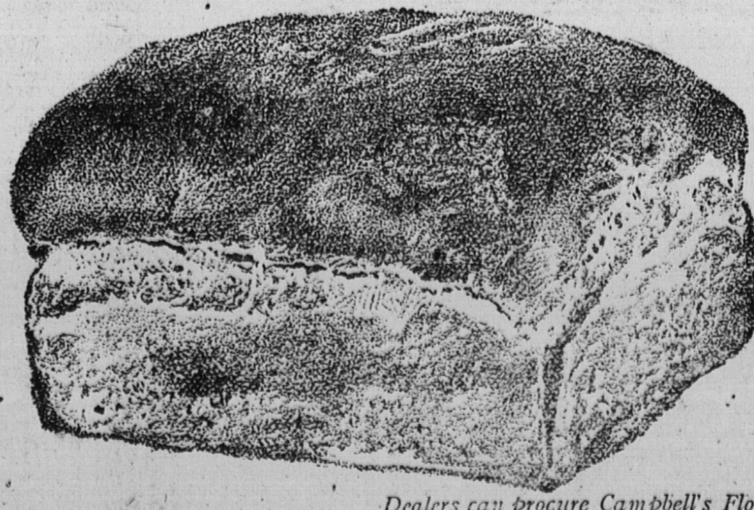
