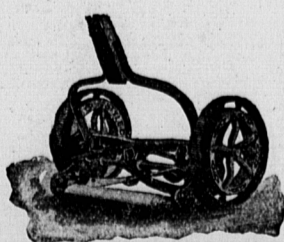

Last Sunday Rev. Hugh Miller, Cornwall, preached in the Methodist Churches at Pleasant Grove, Stanhope and York. There were excellent congregations in attendance at each of the services and the reverend gentleman's efforts were greatly appreciated.

At the last annual meeting of the Executive of the P.E.I. Dairy Association the matter of grants and prizes for the coming season came up for discussion. It was decided to follow the plans of last year with provisions for competitions in the 12 months season as follows:—Where the factories are not operated in the winter season, those who are keeping daily milk records can continue in the competition by supplying returns from such records instead of factory returns. These returns, however, are subject at any time to verification by the Association in any manner the Association may deem necessary. Intending competitors should make entries as soon as possible as the competitions begin June 1st.

A Logan, Utah, exchange has the following in reference to the death of the late lamented J. B. Rackliffe, whose body was interred recently at Hampton:—It is with regret we learn of the death of J. B. Rackliffe, the founder of the Utah Condensed Milk Company, and the firm friend of Cache Valley. Mr. Rackliffe had been ailing for several months, in fact, ever since his arrival in Utah this year. He left Salt Lake City about the middle of March to enter a Boston Hospital for rest and treatment, but kept gradually sinking, and peacefully passed away on the morning of May 9th. His family were at his bedside. He will be greatly missed by his friends and business associates, who fully appreciated his strong genial character, his personality, and his loyal support. Mr. Rackliffe came into our midst unheralded and alone, and through his efforts sprang the Utah Condensed Milk Company, a monument to his integrity and ability. He builded well, supported loyally, and was highly esteemed and loved by all his associates as a courageous, true and stalwart man. One whose heart was with the people of Cache and whose sole ambition was success and the development of this valley and its manufacturing institutions. In 1903 Mr. Rackliffe came to Richmond an entire stranger. His great experience in the milk business told him that the natural condition of the establishment of a condensed milk factory. He liked the people and the country, so the stranger risked his money with a strange people in a strange land, and established what has since developed into one of the greatest agricultural industries of the west. This entire community owes much to the man who brought to its very doors—quietly but firmly laid in its passive lap, this precious boon. So long as the words "Sego Milk" are lisped from the lips of Richmond children, just so long will they revere in sweet memory the name of J. B. Rackliffe.
