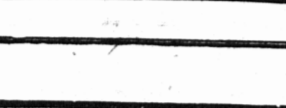

The new Town Council held their first caucus last night.

For being drunk and disorderly one offender was fined \$2 and costs at Police Court yesterday.

Rev. A. E. Burke, Alberton, was in Summerside yesterday and with Capt. Joseph Read arranged to further postpone the meeting at Charlottetown to discuss winter communication until Friday next.

Harold Matthew, Teller of the Summerside Branch of the Merchants' Bank of P. E. I. has gone to Alberton to act as Manager of the branch at that place during Mr. McKie's absence in western Canada.

Thos. McAllister left by the train yesterday afternoon for Cape Traverse and will cross by the ice boats today en route to Point du Chene to take charge of a cargo of potatoes in the schooner Lois for the owners Joseph Read & Co.

George Ramsay who has been visiting his brother John Ramsay, ship builder, Summerside, left yesterday evening via the Capes en route to Boston. Mr. Ramsay intended remaining only three weeks but was storm-stayed here two weeks longer.

Capt. Herbert Iaman and Lieut. Austin Squarebrigg returned home Saturday evening from taking a military course at Fredericton, N. B. On account of the Hotel at Tormentine being full Messrs Iaman and Squarebrigg were obliged to remain at Fort Eggin two days while on the way home.

G. W. Mingay, Toronto, was a passenger by the afternoon train yesterday for Kinkora from whence he will proceed to Charlottetown and Georgetown on return to the Mainland. Mr. Mingay does not like the idea of crossing by the Capes and he has been detained in Summerside at the Hotel Russ during the past three weeks waiting for the steamers to run and railway blockade to open.

The foreign mail via the Capes arrived in Summerside at 4:15 p. m. yesterday. The first Charlottetown mail to come by train for nearly four weeks came in from Cape Traverse yesterday morning. Until the railway line between here and the capital is opened the mails to and from the city will go and come by train to and from Cape Traverse and between there and Charlottetown by team. Mails to and from the west are now also being carried by train.

The death of Mrs. Gough wife of Jailer Thomas Gough, Summerside, which occurred about five o'clock yesterday evening was heard with deep regret by citizens generally. Mrs. Gough had been ill only about a week and her somewhat sudden demise was a shock to the many friends of deceased. The late Mrs. Gough was in the 65th year of her age. Her parents brothers and sisters emigrated to this province from the Isle of Skye, Inverness Scotland and landed in Charlottetown in August 1840, Mrs. Gough being born on the voyage. The surviving members of the family are two brothers Angus McSween, Summerside and John McSween, Colville and three sisters, Mrs. Pearson and Mrs. McDonald, Boston and Mrs. Younker, Moncton. Besides a husband, seven sons and three daughters are left to mourn. The sons are, Fred in Newcastle, N. B.; Ernest at Medicine Hat, Assa.; Rev. John B. Sussex, N. B.; Bradford, Summerside; Douglas, in the U. S.; Horace, Revelstoke, B. C. and William in New York. The daughters are, Miss Annie and Mrs. Roy McDonald, Revelstoke, B. C. and Miss Ida at home. To the bereaved the Guardian extends deepest sympathy.

The death of the two year old son of Wesley and Mrs. Allen, Fifteen Point, occurred Saturday under sad circumstances. The mother having set a bucket of scalding water on the floor turned her back for a minute, when the little fellow reached the bucket and scalded it over himself. The child was badly scalded and the mother being alone was unable to carry him to a neighbor's house about 200 yards distant. It was first thought the wounds were not serious, but Sunday morning heart failure developed which proved fatal. Mr. and Mrs. Allen have the sympathy of many friends in their sad bereavement.

As a result of Summerside's not having a system of water works, insurance rates are about to be advanced another 50c per \$100. The following is a copy of a letter from W. K. Rogers Co., Charlottetown, several of which were received here by merchants yesterday and which will speak for itself:—"We were somewhat surprised to-day to receive a letter from one of our largest Companies, stating that a number of the companies largely interested in Summerside have instructed their representatives to vote in favor of an increase of 50c per \$100 on all mercantile risks in Summerside until such time as a satisfactory water supply has been installed. We understand that some of the other agents here have been similarly instructed and as the new half of year Town Council are just assuming their duties, we thought it best to advise you on this matter in order that it may be brought to their notice."

PREPARATIONS are being made for resuming work on the new paragon property at Kensington, on the Margate circuit as soon as spring opens. An excellent site has been secured on the Margate road, nearly opposite the Episcopal church. The cellar was dug last autumn and stone for the foundation is on the ground. Lumber for the frame is at the mill and over \$1400 has been subscribed. It is expected that the house will be completed in the early part of the summer. During some union services held at Kensington a short time ago a number decided for Christ. Since then thirteen have united with the Presbyterian church, and nineteen have been received on trial for membership in the Methodist church. The Margate school has been superintended for a number of years by H. R. Baker, and he with his staff of officers and teachers has been doing excellent work. At Kensington the school under Isaac Lowther's superintendency, is also doing good work. There has been an increased attendance since the special service. J. M. Duncan, the principal of the day school, has a large class of young men, and his teaching is much appreciated. The union schools at Clinton and Freetown which are largely attended during the summer months have closed for the winter.
