WILBERT GILLESPIE.

Mr. George Gillespie, Clyde River, received the sad news from St. John's, Nfld., of the death of his nephew, Wilbert Gillespie, only son of James and Margaret Gillespie, formerly of New Haven, P.E.I. KAISER IN WRATH BROKE HIS THUMBS.

BALTIMORE, Jan. 22.—Peter Bech formerly a soldier in the German Army, fearing lathum by the police as an enemy alien, went to the registration station today to get his thumbs fixed and displayed two crooked thumbs for which the Kaiser was personally responsible, as evidence that he had no leaning toward socialism.
"I served in the German Army three years," he said. "The Kaiser struck me while I was a member of the Stuttgart Cavalry in 1886. The Kaiser was reviewing the cavalry. I was in the front rank. Apparently, he did not like the position of my thumbs, my hands held the reins of my horse, and he struck them with the back of his sword."
"I was a blockheaded fool to stay in Germany long enough to serve the Kaiser," he said. "I came to the United States twenty-seven years ago. I would not kill the Kaiser; would put him in a cage and give him some of his own discipline—starve him to death as he is causing Germany to be starved now."
Bech is fifty-five years old and married. He showed the police first United States naturalization papers for himself and a receipt for money paid for his second naturalization papers. The second papers, he said, he was to have received on the day the United States declared war upon Germany.
With real men and women difficulty is merely another name for opportunity.

ROD AND GUN

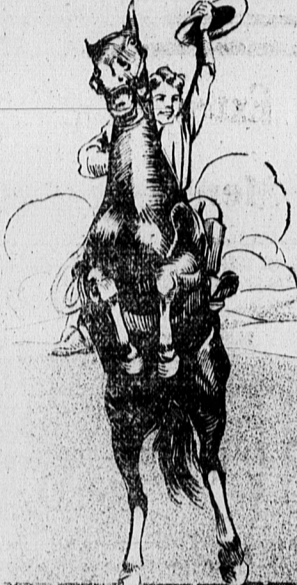

RUSSIAN ASSEMBLY DISSOLVED IN RIOT
Lenine and Trotsky Government Greatly in Minority. Delegates in Brest-Litovsk Quarrelled and Quit. Fresh Troubles in Austria
LONDON, Jan. 22.—The Russian constituent assembly was short lived. Convening Friday in the Tauride Palace in Petrograd during street fighting, it was dissolved early Saturday morning by the Bolshevik after a vote had shown conclusively that the government headed by Lenine and Trotsky was greatly in the minority.
Thus, for the moment at least, has passed away at its inception the experiment of a government which had been hoped would be brought out of the anomalous situation that has existed in Russia since the revolution which resulted in the imperial family and the bureaucrats being thrown out of power.
Likewise the delegates to the peace conference at Brest-Litovsk again are at sixes and sevens and the port parters have ended. As on the other occasions when they ceased, the stumbling block is the German demands and their refusal to withdraw their troops from the occupied portions of Russia.
Evidently the German censors are keeping a strict watch over the German newspapers in their expressions of opinion on the serious internal political situation, for even the meagre reports concerning the doings of the militaristic and anti-militaristic parties were missing Sunday. The latest accounts of the controversy, coming by way of Amsterdam and forwarded by the semi-official Wolff Bureau, were to the effect that the military party had gained a victory over their opponents with regard to the settlement of questions regarding annexations in the east.
Fresh troubles are reported to have broken out throughout Austria.
