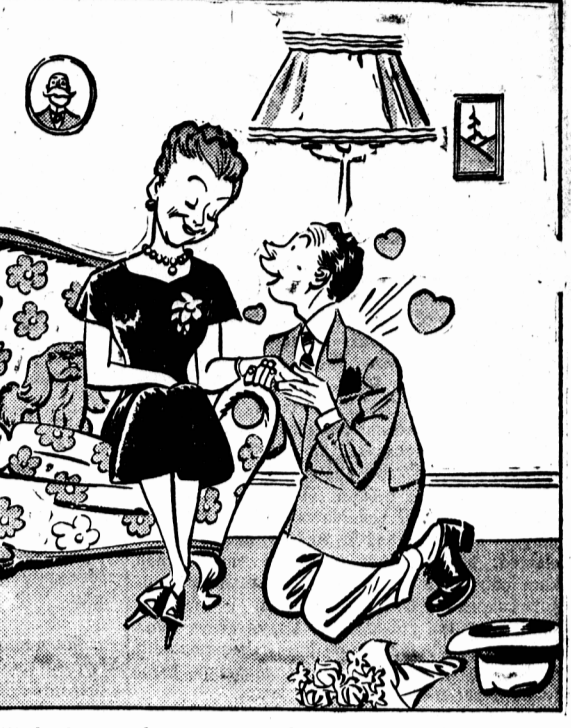
WOMAN MINISTER LIKES HER WORK

VICTORIA, June 3 — Dr. Norah Hughes, only woman to be ordained in the British Columbia United Church Conference, says she has encountered little or no opposition in an otherwise completely masculine field.

"I have found no opposition," she said, "although there are always a few persons prejudiced at first. But it does not last long. If you do a good job, they don't care whether you're a man or a woman."

Here attending a R. C. United Church Conference, Dr. Hughes told reporters that she was ordained in 1940, going to the United Church at Hazel, B. C., a fruit-growing centre 80 miles east of Vancouver.
