POSED AS MINISTER HELSTON, England.—(CP)—Roy P. Newton, an army deserter, posed as a Congregational minister and even took a church service in this Cornish town. He pleaded guilty to theft of church funds and was sent to prison for six months.

Great possibilities are seen in the recently discovered Juniper berries which appear to be well distributed over the province. The berry which is to be found anywhere where cranberries thrive, are in great demand by wholesale drug firms who value their medicinal properties in the manufacture of gin.

A Charlottetown lady took a sample of some Juniper berries to the Department of Agriculture the day following the announcement that Hon. W. H. Dennis, Minister of Agriculture, had investigated their value. Mr. Dennis found that the berries picked by the young lady were even superior to the sample which had been approved by the New York Drug firm. She then announced that she had about 40 more pounds which had been picked in the National Park area where they are reported to be quite thick. In fact, another gentleman remarked that carloads of cranberry pickers from the city working in this same area, were overlooking the lucrative Juniper berries that grow alongside. However, now that the latter berry has been brought to their attention and the additional knowledge that they are worth about 30 cents a pound great interest has been awakened in berry pickers throughout the province.

The reason the lucrative Juniper had not been commercialized before was probably due to the fact that the markets called for the tree variety. This particular type does not exist, as far as it is known, in this province but the dwarf Juniper, which is a short of a shrub, is quite plentiful. Only recently it was found out that the berry from this shrub was equally as good as the one from the tree. The dwarf Juniper, which grows close to the ground, is quite commonly found in blueberry barrens. It closely resembles the latter berry at a distance but on closer examination the difference is noticed. When broken open, unlike the blueberry, the juniper contains a dry substance.

Irish Moss There are a great many other botanicals, to use the term applied to these berries by the drug concerns, scattered throughout the province. The value of most of them is not realized by the majority of people. For instance the common dandelion, sometimes used by Islanders for making into a wine, possesses a root that is in great demand in the manufacture of certain drugs. Then there is the Irish moss at Bideford, which until recently was overlooked. Now it is being developed by a New York firm which finds it invaluable in the manufacturing of dressings, cat-nets, light food, and many other things. Before the war this

Addresses the Rotary Club

Rev. T. H. Bussell Somers, M.A. S.T.M., pastor of St. James Presbyterian Church, Charlottetown, was the guest speaker at the Rotary luncheon yesterday. He gave an interesting address on "A Canadian studies Americans" which he said might also be entitled, "How I Lost My Prejudice" or "An experience in understanding."

The speaker developed a great admiration for the people of United States by close contact with them while living in that country. He spent some time in Buffalo, Detroit, Cleveland, Chicago, Washington, Oregon, California and more recently in New York where he took a post graduate course. He made reference to their friendliness, adventurous spirit, resourcefulness, as well as their hopeful, happy, care-free nature and other characteristics. Mr. Somers also quoted from a message by President Henry S. Coaling, D.D., of the Union Seminary, N. Y. and published in the Church of Scotland's magazine wherein he explained why the United States may have been slow in taking the attitude they have since taken in the international situation.

Reference was made to the sum-total character of the United States population. British have the motherland to more than a fraction of the people. Germany and Italy lie behind many millions as their names attest, but with France the United States was started and the President was backed when he at once placed arms and ammunition at the disposal of Britain.

"We awake to the danger to our principles and institutions," said Dr. Coffin.

Led by our President and nobly encouraged by Mr. Wilkie we have been struggling to prepare our defenses and supply all possible aid to Britain and China. More and more it is clear to our people despite loud voices to the contrary that our cause and yours are inextricably interwoven."
