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### SOOND ADVICE TO FOX RANCHERS

the pelts with the usual result that comparatively few sales were made. Then the skins would be carted around this market to the various dealers, large and small, with similar unsuccessful results. In our opinion the methods referred to are detrimental, not only to those offering their pelts in this manner, but likewise to the entire industry of the Island. Without ulterior motive, we would counsel strongly some arrangement between the breeders and owners of Silver Fox pelts, that will eliminate the promiscuous offering of the pelts. Furthermore, we would strongly advise limiting the output of pelts to be marketed by the introduction of scientific and business methods in selecting the animals to be killed. If this work be done in a careful manner, as it should be, the killing of animals, the pelts of which are not what they should be, could be largely avoided. In that manner, the owners of the Ranches would achieve much better results and avoid having to place upon the market a large quantity of pelts which never should have been killed. We understand that a large number of breeders have formed an Association for the purpose of controlling and marketing the pelts that are pur-

chased on the Island. In this connection, we are free to state that it is our opinion that the best interests of the breeders of Silver Fox should result from close co-operation with such a Board.

Through united action, many benefits are bound to accrue to all concerned, assuming as we do that the Board will be governed by a Board of Directors in whom the utmost confidence may be placed, and who will absolutely conduct the Board with favoritism to none and with justice to all.

We are well aware that it is always a difficult problem to convince a large body of individuals that their best interests will be conserved by co-operation so that unanimous action may be had, and yet it is advisable that every effort be made in the interests of all, in the creation of a Sales Board, that by wise and unselfish counsel may eliminate many of the evils that already prevail, and that are apt to increase, substituting therefore, reliable and trustworthy information with such recommendations from time to time as may be advisable, so as to achieve the very best possible results, both in the methods of collecting and handling the pelts, as well as the adoption of rules and regulations for the sale of the pelts. There is therefore, no doubt in our opinion but that the market for Silver Fox pelts in general should be an active one and those interested in the fur industry

located on Prince Edward Island should be able to look back upon a very successful season, and particularly so if there be proper co-operation in the interests of all and with favoritism to none.

Alexander Smyth, 5th C. M. R. 13 Platoon, 3rd Canadian Division, France. Dear Mrs. Smyth:—By now you will have long learned of the death of your husband in this hospital. His wounds were in the leg and arm and the fatal gas poisoning set in and could not be arrested. He had not really a great amount of pain, I would at his request lay my hand on his head, and he would sink happily to sleep. I sat with him all the day of his death and at ten o'clock I gave him Holy Communion. He was quiet and peaceful after that, dying at three o'clock. He left these special messages for you—"Tell her how badly I was hit, but what a glorious end it is. Say that I received Holy Communion just before and send her my love, my love but the splendid love of God to be with her always."

#### ROUMANIA ARMY INTACT.

LONDON, Dec. 1.—Although satisfied that the Roumanian army is still absolutely intact, Major-General F. B. Maurice, Chief Director of Military Operations at the War Office, told the Associated Press today that any further advance by the Germans would mean a considerable success for them. General Maurice said: "There is no use minimizing the fact that the further advance of the Germans means considerable success as a step forward gives them the corn district while a still further step

means their possession of the oil belts. Russia is moving, however, and the fact that the Roumanian army is still intact is encouraging. Even the reports claim they have taken only 1,200 men and a few guns, which means that my prediction of last week, that no more than the rear guard would be captured, has been more than fulfilled. "The Roumanians have been occupying a dangerous position, with one army hammering from the north, while another was coming up from the Danube, and its safe extraction is no mean feat of arms. Whether this intact army means to make a stand before the capital remains to be seen.

"Pursuing the tactics with which we have become familiar on the West front, the German official communique have been falsely announcing that our successes at Saloniki have only obtained a partial objective, but as a matter of fact we have won the positions desired, the Serbians and the French Zouaves taking a very important hill on one wing, while the Italians won their objective on the other.

#### VIGOROUS NEW INTRIGUE TO MOBILIZE PEACE SENTIMENT.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 28.—Washington is watching with interest the latest German intrigues to mobilize neutral and American opinion in the

interest of an immediate peace. There have been many such efforts in the last two years, but never quite such a vigorous one. From Latin America as well as from different parts of the United States comes news of the activities of the Prussian agents.

Their idea apparently is to work up a demand for a League of Neutrals which should somehow or other force the allies to stop fighting. To Catholic South America, they suggest the Pope as its head. Here Mr. Wilson is boomed for the doubtful honor. Great efforts are being made to discover means whereby pressure may be brought to bear upon the allies. You will, when Congress meets next month, hear much about a movement to place an embargo upon the exports of foodstuffs. The movement has its origin in popular disquiet at the steady rise in commodity prices. But everywhere the Germans are behind. It and before long it will be coupled with a renewed agitation for the prohibition of the export of munitions. Neither demand will come to anything. The industrial elements may be continued upon to defeat the embargo upon munitions even if the Government were not already committed against it. Against the food embargo the Government is not committed—but here are farming interests step in. The farmers have everything to gain by a continuance of high food prices,

and especially since the recent triumph of the West in the Presidential election their representatives in Congress should be strong enough to defeat it.

#### FORCE WILL NOT BE USED.

ATHENS, Dec. 1.—via London, November 30.—According to an Entente diplomat, King Constantine has given assurance to Admiral Du Fournet, commander of the Anglo-French fleet in the Mediterranean, that order will be maintained Friday, the date of the expiration of the Admiral's ultimatum for the surrender of the Greek artillery. The diplomat also says that on the other hand Admiral Du Fournet has promised that the measures he will take to induce compliance with his demand will not include forcible seizure of arms.

#### GERMANY TO PAY LOSSES.

THE HAGUE, Dec. 1.—via London.—Germany has declared to the Government of the Netherlands her readiness to pay damage for the Dutch freighter Bloemendaal and her grain cargo, while the rest of the vessels cargo is to be submitted to a prize court. Official announcement was made to this effect today to the Associated Press. The Bloemendaal was sunk off Nantucket last October by a German submarine.
