### De Valera Still Has Faith In The League

(C.P. Havas, By Guardian's Special Wire)

DUBLIN, May 25 (CP) — The Irish Free State may in its own interests withdraw from the League of Nations, President Eamon de Valera told the Dail tonight. He added he hoped this would not happen.

"The present position of the League is more or less doubtful," he said. "The tests that the league has had to face have shaken it to the foundations. But I still believe there are great possibilities in the league for small nations. The best hope for the League is to get all nations—certainly all the states of Europe—into it."

The Free State can make no plans for national defence as long as its territory can be occupied by Great Britain at Britain's will, de Valera said.

If Free State independence were complete, he declared, British aid to prevent foreign invaders from gaining a foothold on Irish territory would be to the mutual interest of both London and Dublin.

### Order Arrest of "Socrat" Leader

WINNIPEG, May 24 (CP) — Royal Canadian Mounted Police held a warrant tonight for the arrest of Dr. S. W. Fox, leader of the Social Credit Group in the Manitoba Legislature, charging that he performed a criminal operation.

The warrant was issued by Magistrate Thomas Little of Dauphin, Man., on information furnished by a police constable following investigation of a case with which Dr. Fox was said to be connected at Grandview, Man.

Dr. Fox is believed to be in the United States although police efforts to locate him have been futile. He left Grandview the night of May 9 and was in Winnipeg the next day. Police said he left for the United States May 11.

HACKENSACK, N. J., May 24 (CP) — The late General Jay J. Morrow took his Army football team seriously. It appeared today after the will of the late General was filed for probate.

General Morrow, who made a bequest to Jon Lindbergh, son of his niece, Mrs. Charles A. Lindbergh, excluded a sister, Mrs. Agnes Scandrett of Washington, in these words:

"I'm leaving Agnes out of this because one of her sons sat beside me in an Army-Navy football game, in an Army seat and cheered lustily for the Navy."

To Jon Lindbergh, General Morrow who died a month ago, left a set of cuff links, four vest buttons and three studs, all in a platinum and pearl pattern.

### Cardinal's Remarks Protested By Reich

VATICAN CITY, May 24 (AP) — Vatican prelates, replying to German newspaper demands that the Holy See act to retract a speech by Cardinal Mundelein of Chicago assailing Chancellor Hitler and his attitude toward the church, said tonight the Cardinal had every right to speak his own mind.

The Vatican will not concern itself with either a repudiation or a defence of the Cardinal's remarks, the prelates stated.

They said the Cardinal, as head of the Archdiocese, did not need to consult the Vatican before he spoke his views.

The Cardinal, in an archdiocesan speech, referred to Hitler as an "Austrian paperhanger" and to a Nazi-published series of trials of German monks and lay brothers on immorality charges as worse than Great War "atrocities."

### Plan Welcome For Endeavour

NEWPORT, R. I., May 24 (CP) — Newport's saltiest citizens put their heads together today over charts and weather maps and went ahead with plans to welcome Endeavour I Sunday.

The big racing sloop, which T. O. M. Sopwith, British challenger for the America's Cup, may send against an American defender yet to be elected, has not been sighted since she parted a towing hauler from the motor yacht Viva in a gale 1,000 miles off Newport a week ago.

Viva came in alone yesterday and gave assurance Endeavour I was proceeding under her own canvas at about six knots when radio communication failed last Saturday night.

### Coal-miners In Sit-down Strike

(A. P. by Guardian's Special Wire)

GILLESPIE, Ill., May 24—The president of the Superior Coal Company today offered to discuss settlement of a sit-down strike of approximately 500 men in the depths of one of the company's mines but the strikers prepared cheerfully for a long siege.

Ample provisions, supplied with blankets and a variety of musical instruments, they sang, played cards, read and opened the meeting in the early morning at the mine at nearby Wilsonville, a small village.

Their leaders asserted they would not come up until their demands were met. There were two demands—that work be shared with 300 idle miners and that a stop be put to mechanization of the workings, which the strikers asserted jeopardized jobs of many miners. But the "share-the-work" demand was predominant.

### USEFUL VINEGAR

Dull Brass may be quickly cleaned by rubbing it with a piece of rag dipped in vinegar mixed with a little salt. Leave it for a few minutes then wash off with warm water. Dry well and polish.

To give light or dark paint a good gloss, use equal quantities of vinegar and paraffin. Apply this with a soft cloth and polish with a duster.

Varnish may be cleaned with a chamomile leather dipped in vinegar and cold water.

To clean a vacuum flask that has not been used for some time, crush an egg shell finely and put it in the flask with some vinegar. Put in the cork, shake well and rinse with warm water.

Stains in flower vases or decanters may be removed by soaking them in warm water containing vinegar and salt. Shake them occasionally and rinse well in cold water.

Dark woollens will keep their colors better if they are washed in warm soapy water containing a little vinegar.

### LAUNDRY HINTS WASHING OF DIFFERENT MATERIALS

Washing of course, cannot be treated as a whole, owing to the fact that each particular kind of article, and even material, calls for different treatment if it is to be washed successfully, but these hints may prove helpful.

In the first place, you must separate the various kinds of washing which may have to be done at the same time. By that I mean colored garments, white garments, woolen and cotton fabrics must be washed separately. Taking colored garments first, if these are linen or cotton materials, and new, they should first of all be soaked in cold salted water to set the colours. After this they should be washed quickly in warm soapy water, then rinsed twice, first in luke-warm water, and then in clear cold water, after which they should be put through the wringer and hung out to dry. ### India Wants Full Equality Is Claim

LONDON, May 24 (CP) Cable India wants full equality within the Empire, said Sir Zafrullah Khan, member of the Governor-General's Executive Council and an Indian delegate to the Imperial Conference, in a broadcast tonight.

Speaking in a series of talks on the responsibilities of Empire, Khan said there was a "certain incompleteness" in the Indian citizenship.

He recalled that the Viceroy is responsible to the United Kingdom Government for defence and foreign affairs and asserted that Indians were discriminated against in some of the dominions and colonies.

India desired to retain membership in the Empire, he said, but he claimed for her the "status of a full equal member along with the other dominions."
