British Public Saving Money

LONDON, April 8.—There was a great rush for National Savings Certificates in Friday, the last day they were purchasable for 15 shillings 6 pence. The new price is 16 shillings.

The post offices of London were inundated with applications and, as anticipated, there was a record number of sales. Sales for the week ending March 25 numbered 5,227,350, the largest number sold in any week since February, 1917. During the four weeks ending March 25 certificates were sold to the number of 16,837,243, and for the past six months 49,119,781, compared with 27,019,567 in the corresponding six months of last year.

An interesting fact arising out of the boom is that larger sums will be available for local authorities for as a consequence of arrangements made in October last local authorities may apply for loans up to fifty per cent. of the amount of all savings certificates sold in their areas. These loans are mainly applied to road-making sewer construction, electricity undertakings and the extension of parks and recreation grounds. The total amount of loan money applied for since last October is about £5,000,000. Altogether from the start of the movement to the 25th of March last, the number of certificates sold was 526,998,353, representing a total value of £408,000,000.
