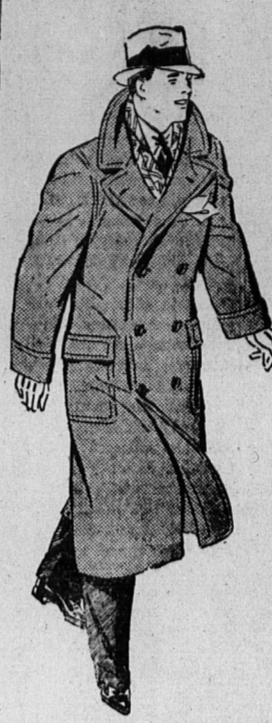

—**DEPARTURE REGRETTED**—Capt. Francis Kelly of the Church Army stationed at the Church of the Holy Trinity, Georgetown, is to leave shortly to undertake work in the parish of St. Michael's at Moose Jaw, Saskatchewan. Capt. Kelly came from St. Matthew's, Quebec City about two years ago to look after the Anglican interests in the Eastern section of the Island under the direction of the Rev. Canon Malone of St. Peter's Cathedral. During his stay and labours on Prince Edward Island he has become widely known throughout the towns in the East and also in Charlottetown. His departure will be regretted by a great many not only those of the Anglican faith but also those of other denominations. Georgetown and Souris will especially miss him. During his stay at Georgetown, the Anglican Church saw many improvements. The Church itself will stand as a memorial to him for it was through his efforts and unselfish devotion that the interior was renovated during this present year. He guarded the interests of the Anglicans with great zeal and is a preacher of no mean merits. In fact few men of his age could compare with him in the pulpit. Periodically he held services in the different homes and brought to the people the ministrations of their own Church. The Church of England on the Island will regret his departure but one man's loss is another's gain. The Church Army has in Captain Kelly a fine and loyal Churchman and an energetic officer and he bespeaks well of the work of the Church Army and we sincerely wish him every good wish in the field where he is going and that he will carry pleasant memories of the Island with him.
