TORONTO, Nov. 3.—Word was received yesterday of the death while on a visit to Glasgow of Professor James Mavor, formerly occupying the chair of political economy at University of Toronto. Prof. Mavor, who was born in Scotland 71 years ago, was world famous as an author and lecturer on economic subjects.
