
—RECRUITING IN ALBERTON.—Dr. McPhee (A. M. D. for Prince Co.) visited Alberton Tuesday in the interests of recruiting. He found the work satisfactory, and expressed his opinion very favorably in the skillful recruiting campaign that is being carried on by Lieut. White. At present Lieut. White's office is in the headquarters in the Armories on Main Street. Those who have already enlisted are Messrs Stanley Brown, Harry Malley, John Weeks, and William Morrison. Mr. Heber Hardy was successful in the medical examination.—A.

—COMMISSION IN 105TH FOR ISLAND HERO.—Lieut. J. F. White, a veteran of that world-famous regiment, "Princess Pats" has secured his commission and is now attached to the 105th reinforcements. Lieut. White was on active service for over a year with that glorious regiment. During early spring 1916, he was invalided home, suffering from shell wounds. However, during his invigorating furlough, Lieut. White has almost wholly recuperated his former splendid physique today. Canada has few more qualified lieutenants than Lieut. White. Since Lieut. White received his commission he has been appointed Recruiting Officer for West Prince and now he is busy recruiting for three branches

of the service:—Infantry, artillery and engineers. Already he has secured four recruits and his hopes are high for securing the better part of a platoon. Alberton and vicinity alone has over fifty able-bodied single men fit for military service and there is every reason to believe that the splendid example, which characterized the recruiting of "C" Company 105th, and the already enlisted men of four "reinforcement" volunteers will be kept up. One worthy feature of the latest recruits is the example set by the married men: Out of four two are married.—A.

—FULLY RECOVERED.—The young lad, Harold Knight, Tryon, whose fingers and hand were badly crushed while operating a knitting machine a few weeks ago was on Saturday discharged from the Prince County Hospital, his wounds having all healed up.—H.

I bed my horse liberally with straw. They rest much better and are easier to curry when well bedded. I throw out all old used straw every three or four days, as bedding loses much of its elasticity by use and solid straw gives a hiding place for germs, thus promoting disease.
