### HORSE NOTES.

Prowse & Sons, Murray Harbor, have shipped their speedy pacing mare Nellie Dot to trainer Cameron, City, to prepare for the racing season. She is a very handsome mare sired by Billy McGee. This mare has won several races the past winter and bids fair to become a game race mare. Mr. Cameron has ten horses in his stable at present, including some of the best bred racing prospects in the Province. He will move his horses to the Charlottetown Driving Park about June 1st. He has the stallions Banito 2.18 1/2 holder of the Provincial race record for stallions. Banito has been mated with some of the best brood mares on the Island including Capitola, Elsie Mac, 2.22, and the old Lady Hilda, 2.30, dam of Mabel T. 2.23. He also has the 3 year old colt Geo. Crescens, 2.48 1/2, holder of the provincial race record for 2 year-olds in 1907. He has a very handsome colt in Sir Ban by Banito, dam the brood mare Jessica, dam of Israel 2.19 and two others in the list. The mare Prulera (3) 2.30 which won second money in the 4 year stake at Halifax last season has been shifted over to pacing and appears to take to her new way of going like a duck takes to water, and another horse deserving of mention is the roan gelding Tom Trina. This colt looks big and strong and with a season's training will no doubt be the wire when the bell rings, fit to make a good showing. It will be remembered this colt holds the 2 year old race record in 1906 of 2.44. He was not trained any last season but carried over for this reason as he is now a 4 year old.

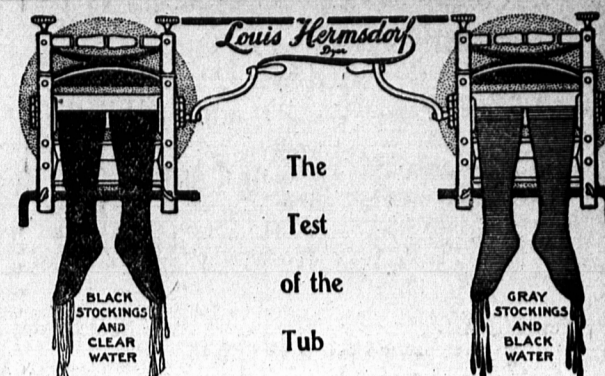

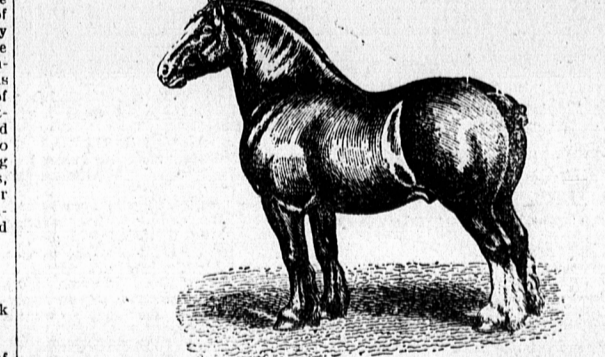
