MacDonald and Daughters at Jasper Park

JASPER, Alta., Sept. 4.—Ramsay MacDonald, in his Labor Day speech said: "On behalf of the labor movement of Great Britain, I bring greetings to the labor movement of Canada and trust that it will have a very auspicious Labor Day. In travelling through Canada as we have been doing, I have been impressed by two things particularly, Canada's beauty and its wealth. With regard to the former I hope it will never be desecrated for the sake of utilitarianism and I trust that the working people will see that they get their just share of the latter."

This was the message to the people of Canada on the eye of Labor Day by Right Hon. J. Ramsay MacDonald, first Labor Prime Minister of Great Britain, who is now enjoying a short rest at Jasper Park Lodge.

With his three daughters Isabel, Sheila and Jean, Mr. MacDonald arrived at Jasper from Prince Rupert on Sunday evening after what he describes as one of the most delightful trips he has ever taken.

The voyage on the Prince George from Vancouver, the journey from the coast here was full of incidentally greeted at every stop and at one village in the mountains he was met by a delegation consisting of an Irishman, a Swede and an Italian.

His daughter Jean drove the engine for twenty miles on the trip bringing it to a successful stop at Mount Robson where she gave up

the controlling of the throttle for that of enjoying scenery. Sunday morning the four climbed into the saddle and rode over the twisting mountain trails to Maligne Canyon. The route, which is a new one, winds through the woods and goes from the Canyon back to the Lodge by way of the Swift Maligne River and the Athabasca, giving the riders many spectacular views. Although they declined to wear chaps or sombreros the MacDonalds showed themselves to be enthusiastic trail riders. They were accompanied by Mr. E. H. Knight, Supt. of Jasper National Park and his two daughters. After luncheon the former prime minister and his daughters made up a foursome and played over the lodge golf course.

CANADIAN PREMIER VISITS GENEVA

GENEVA, Sept. 3.—Canada was signally honored today by the delegates to the Ninth Assembly of the League of Nations, when Right Hon. William Lyon Mackenzie King, Premier of the Dominion was elected as vice-president.

Premier King, the first Canadian Premier to attend a session of the League Assembly received 33 votes. Twenty-two votes were necessary to elect him.

The Canadian Premier, who has taken an active part in the deliberations of the assembly, expressed some views of the work of the Assembly to the Canadian Press correspondent during an hour and a half suspension of the meeting today.

"It seems to me," he said, "that the League of Nations is rapidly exhausting the questions arising from the war. The time will soon come when most of these questions will be settled one way or another. Those remaining possibly can be left to the League secretariat or to a special call of the Council or Assembly."
