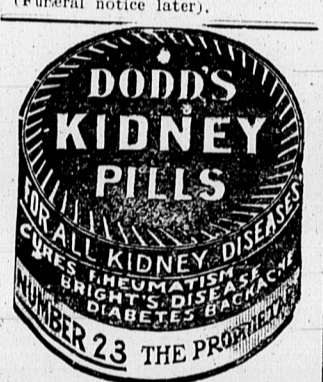

## ECHOES OF STORM ON NEW ENGLAND COAST

### The D. A. R. Liner Boston Has 29 Hour Battle With Gale.

"Tell those women for me that this ship went through the Portland gale and other storms worse than this. We are running out to sea to keep off shore. The good ship Boston will reach Boston a little late, but she will get there."

The above message was sent to frightened lady passengers in the saloon of the Dominion Atlantic steamer Boston which left Yarmouth for Boston last Saturday evening, and which did not reach her destination until midnight on Sunday. When the ship docked the passengers gave the highest praise to Captain Simms and his crew and commended the staunch steamer, too, for the manner in which the ship came through the gale. It was a terrific trip, one of the worst the Boston ever went through. This is saying a great deal for the Boston was one of the few ocean-goers; vessels which weathered the fearful gale of '98 in which the steamer Portland went down.

The run usually takes seventeen hours. The Boston left Yarmouth at 6 p. m. Saturday and did not dock at Long wharf, Atlantic avenue, till 11 Sunday night, a run of twenty-nine hours. Twenty-one hours of this time were spent in fighting the gale. All day Sunday the Boston kept out to sea, Captain Simms preferring the open water and full force of the gale rather than take a chance of being driven on shore.

The story of this last triumph of the Boston over the fury of the seas was told by First Mate Andrew A. MacDonald, who talked in the absence of Captain Simms: "We left Yarmouth at six o'clock Saturday night with sixty-eight passengers, most of them women who had gone from Boston and New England to get Christmas dinner at their homes.

"It was a bright night when we started out. The sky was clear. The moon was nearly at its full. The only wind was a light northwest breeze. "At two o'clock Sunday morning we ran into a northeaster. The moon became obscured and there was a blinding snow storm. All night long we battled against the gale.

"We were compelled to keep all the passengers in the saloon. It would have been as much as their lives were worth to allow them on deck. Captain Simms never left the bridge from the time we struck the storm till we arrived at Long wharf.

The women became frightened at first, but they behaved splendidly on the whole. Captain Simms sent two of the men to the cabin to assure them that we would pull through. "This message cheered them up. The passengers even sang. Some were seasick, of course, the boat pitched so.

"The seas ran high and the snow was so blinding that the trip was one of the worst the Boston had in her eighteen years service. We had an awful time down the coast of Maine, worse even, it seemed than that night when the Portland went down.

"At 7 o'clock Sunday morning, although we could not see, our soundings showed that we were off Thatcher's. Then we ran to the open sea—and an awful sea it was. We kept to sea all day Sunday. Then as the storm moderated, we ran toward the shore. At 8 o'clock Sunday night we caught a glim and we made it out to be Thatcher's. Then we headed direct to Boston, making Long Wharf at 11 o'clock. Some of the passengers slept on board Sunday night."

The Boston on her return to Yarmouth left her pier a little late but at about the usual hour the good ship was reported off the Light-house and came up to her dock looking just as she did when leaving the previous Saturday evening—the fastest and safest boat running from a Nova Scotia port to Boston in the winter season. Captain Simms told The Times that he had seen the water very much smoother than it was on Sunday, but it was not so friendly on that day. The Boston brought 180 passengers and took back 143, part of her cargo consisting of 883 crates live lobsters which sold yesterday at \$20 and \$12.

The ship arrived in Boston on Thursday at 1 p. m.—Yarmouth Times, Dec 31st. Andrew A. MacDonald referred to is a brother of A. J. McDonald of Souris and has many friends and relatives here.

## TYPHOID SIMPLY A FILTH DISEASE

TORONTO, Jan. 8—"Typhoid is a filth disease, and its existence, to easily preventible is a disgrace to Ontario," said Professor McPhedran at the Empire Club banquet yesterday, while moving a vote of thanks for the address delivered by Prof. L. S. Barker, the Club's guest, on the "Triumphs of Preventive Medicine."

Prof. McPhedran also made some references to the extremely high percentages in infant mortality in Ontario, 195 deaths per thousand births in Toronto, and 150 per thousand in Ontario; to the terrible overcrowding in some portions of Toronto, worse, as a Birmingham man said, than any slum in his own home city, to the lack of enforcement of vaccination, to ineffective means for disposal of sewage and treatment of water. He said that there was a terrible waste of lives and in the ultimate analysis of money, because of the neglect of preventive measures.

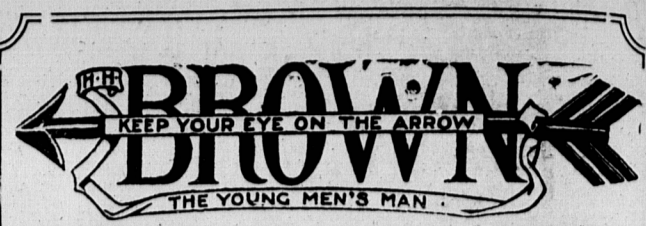
