PROCEEDINGS IN PARLIAMENT

Militia Bill Further Considered—Sir Frederic Denies Creating a Standing Army—Foster's Criticism—The Pacific Cable Deficit—Judge Longley's Appointment.

OTTAWA, June 12.—(Special)—Only a brief session was held today.

Sir Frederic Borden's Militia Bill was considered and Mr. Foster objected to what he termed the creation of a standing army.

He wanted only men enough to garrison the depots for instructional purposes. A line of these would extend across Canada

and form the nucleus of the first line of defence.

He denied the reports that difficulty was experienced in securing men all the men required can easily be obtained, he said.

The remainder of the session was spent in discussing the estimates and among the items passed was one for \$125,000 for Canada's share of the deficit in the year's work on the Pacific cable.

The appointment of Attorney General Longley to the Nova Scotia Bench is confirmed.

HOW THE NAVAL BATTLE WAS LOST
