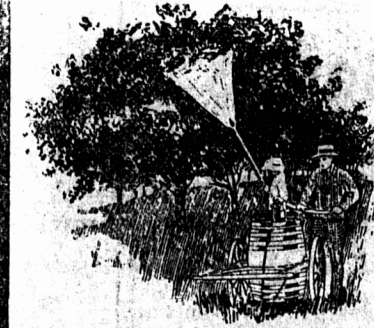

MRS. CHARLES HUNT.—Word was received in Charlottetown yesterday of the death of Mrs. Hunt, relict of Charles Hunt, formerly of Summerside. No particulars were received as to her illness. Mrs. Hunt, whose former home was in Summerside, left the province several years ago to reside with her son, Harry in New York. She has since visited her former home at intervals, her last visit being about two years ago. She was a most estimable and lovable lady and many friends will learn of her death with deep regret. She leaves to mourn, one daughter, Mrs. McLennan, Winnipeg, and one son, Harry, an engineer in New York City besides a large circle of relatives and friends.

PROGRESSING.—Mr. Johan A. Van Tilburg, Associate I. E. E., representing the Canadian Fairbanks Co. St. John, was in Charlottetown yesterday returning from attending a public meeting of the Kensington citizens, with Mr. W. G. West, the hydraulic expert for the company. The meeting was to consider the installation of an up-to-date light and water system preparatory to incorporation and the unanimous vote of the meeting was that a committee be appointed to secure the most desirable location for wells and the amount of water procurable and to report at a meeting to be held in about two weeks time. It is the town's intention to install a water system for domestic use and fire protection as the recent fire showed the urgent need of such and with the valuable information given by Mr. Van Tilburg a plan and make ready for much more for the following year.

The promoters are all young men of Charlottetown. They have demonstrated their own faith in the project by taking over 529 acres of land at a cost of almost \$20,000. The site is proposed to cover two miles of shore front extending practically from the Indian camps near the Rocky Point wharf right along to the Block House, taking in the old Cumberland property, Fort La Jolie and nearly the whole historic area of the early French settlement. Beyond the Block House they take in the Holland Cove farm with nearly a mile of bay shore front, with its hills and dales, providing sites for tourist hotels, bungalows and summer homes not to be equalled on the whole Atlantic or Gulf seaboard.

The promoters have put up their cash, or pledged their credit for almost twenty thousand dollars, every cent of which they propose to put into the common stock of the company. That is their faith. PREFERRED STOCK ISSUE FOR DEVELOPMENT. For this spring's development work the Company proposes to issue fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000.) of seven per cent preferred stock which it is expected will be taken up at short notice, not only by general investors, but particularly by the business houses of Charlottetown, the transportation companies, and others who will directly benefit to a large extent by the development of tourist business to Charlottetown and to the Province generally. This preferred stock will be issued at \$100. per share, \$10 payable with the application and \$10 per month for nine months.

SAFE INVESTMENT SEVEN PER CENT. It is proposed at all times to put every cent of the proceeds of the sale of preferred stock into development work and the act of incorporation will be so drawn that the preferred shareholders must receive their full dividend before the holders of common stock can receive anything from the profits. And as the promoters are putting their money altogether into common stock in the expectation of immediate returns, it will be seen that the preferred stock investment is likely to be a good one, ensuring a high rate of interest and practically certain returns.

BIG HELP FOR CHARLOTTETOWN. The promoters believe that in addition to starting a real development of the summer tourist business in proximity to Charlottetown and thus adding to the trade of all business establishments in Charlottetown, almost creating so far as Charlottetown is concerned, a new industry, they believe also that the project will be a profitable one and that the
