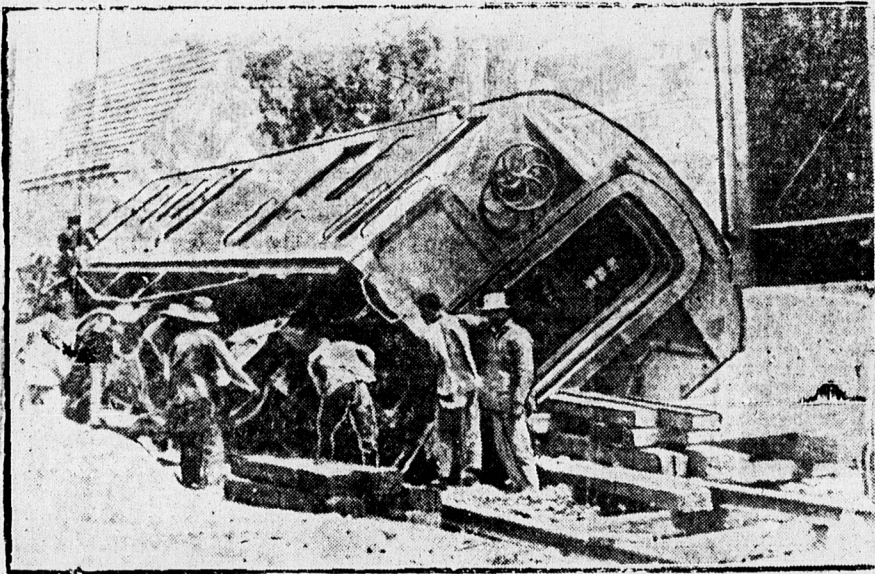

BRITISH EXPERT SUGGESTS LIMIT ON AIR ARMAMENTS

LONDON, Aug. 2.—Major-General Sir Frederick Maurice, who was Chief of the British Military Operations for Great Britain during the war, declares in an article on the increase in the air forces of France and Britain that "it is high time the question of limitation of armaments is taken up seriously."

General Maurice emphasizes Great Britain's willingness to enter into a conference on the reduction of air armaments similar to the Washington conference on naval armaments. But for the present, he says, Britain must not self-protection, bring her air strength up to that of France.
