In Memoriam

WM. D. WIGHT

On May 12, 1941, the citizens of Georgetown, Panama, and Sturgeon were deeply grieved when they had learned of the rather unexpected death of Wm. D. Wight.

The late Mr. Wight was born at Sturgeon on March 16, 1876, and was the second Adam Wight and Margaret Steele, his wife. In 1901 he married Minnie Campbell of Sturgeon and together they settled in their new home on Panama. There, by honest labour, thrift and industry they succeeded in building a nice home and were blessed with fifteen children, of whom eleven survive. Mr. Wight was an unceasing worker. Besides farming he was actively engaged in the lobster fishing industry. At one time he owned and operated a lobster canning plant at Panama. This plant was later amalgamated with orders to form the Eastern Canneries, in which Mr. Wight was a director and one of its most ardent supporters. For a number of years later he managed the Canneries Packing plant at Boughton Island where he made a host of friends by his honesty, uprightness, and assiduity.

In March, 1932, he purchased a home at Burnt Point, having sold his former holding at Panama. His health began to fail and he was obliged to retire somewhat from his very active life. For a few years he was official receiver for the Farmers' Creditors' Arrangement Act, which work he carried on faithfully and efficiently.

On Sunday evening, May 11, while attending vesper devotions at St. James' Church, Georgetown, he suddenly taken ill. He was removed to the parochial house, where medical aid was immediately summoned, but he failed to recover and on the following forenoon he passed peacefully away, having been fortified by the last consolatory rites of Holy Mother Church which were administered by his pastor, Rev. Owen Kiggins.

His funeral took place on Thursday morning to St. James' Church, where Requiem Mass was celebrated by the pastor, assisted by Rev. F. Mulally, Sturgeon, and Rev. Wm. McCabe, St. George's. Burial was in St. James' cemetery, Georgetown.

The honorary pall-bearers were: Capt. C. Fitzgerald, Dr. Kennedy, Howard MacDonald, Nelson Hanson, E. B. MacLaren, and Chester Llewellyn, and the acting pall-bearers were: J. J. Condon, Earl Walsh, Peter Solomon, George MacCormac, Ray Lavandier and Pat Murphy.

Besides his bereaved widow there are left to mourn the following sons and daughters: Newman, Joseph, Nellie (Mrs. Craig), Marjorie; Margaret (Mrs. Clem. Landrigan) New York; Mildred (Mrs. Gerge MacDonald) Charlottetown; Arch., of Burnt Point; Nell, of Georgetown; Rev. Howard Wight, Holy Heart Seminary, Halifax; Rupert, Rita and Eileen (Mrs. B. Batchler) at home, and Clem. of the R. C. A. F., Sydney N. S., who was flown home on the day of his father's death. The late Mr. Wight is survived also by one brother James Thomas of Sturgeon, and Mrs. Jack Power, New Perth; Mrs. Lawrence Campbell, Panmure, and Mrs. Joe Fisher, Boston.

P.E.I. Orphanage

The following report was submitted by Miss Eva Beer, R. N., nurse in charge at the Prince Edward Island Protestant Orphanage at the annual meeting of the Provincial Women's Auxiliary of the institution recently.

Dec. 31st, 1941

Madam President,
Delegates assembled,
We closed our year's work, still under the shadow of war, conditions which have spared us all to greater effort on behalf of our children—During the past year 68 children received care for various periods, our daily average being 45 and our highest 55, the lowest 39 at close of year that being lowest since 1927. Fifteen children were admitted during the year and 23 discharged. Six went to foster homes, and two older boys were fortunate to secure comfortable homes where they are to be helped and earn their board and keep. Nine went back to their parents, when home conditions improved. One child was taken by its grand-

mother, three children were taken by their half sister. We have four older children receiving free boarding home care for several years now and they are well cared for, happy and contented, useful to those who care for them. Our annual summer appeal on behalf of our charges to the warm hearted people of our Island had better results as you can see, than heretofore. Owing to the call from our distressed mother country to protect their future citizens people who opened their hearts and homes to these children, the demand being greater than supply—turned their thoughts to their own Prince Edward Island children, with the results as stated and children went to foster homes. We are confidently looking forward to further co-operation, to the enriching of many homes, now childless, or with one little one needing a playmate, bringing to childless homes the pitter of little feet, the smile from baby eyes and the loving embrace of chubby arms. In this institution today you can see for yourselves, many homeless children, attractive well cared for—yes—but no future assured, no mother to give them the tender care they need, no father to shield them. We have letters on file telling us of the happiness, that child-reared or taken without adoption—have brought to their new parents, the home being added interest given to the family life—a glorious object to be attained in development of the little one, physically—mentally and spiritually—a reward to be won not only here but hereafter. Any one child-minded, by a visit here should be able to find a child to fill that void but don't make up your mind, that it must be a blue eyed curly headed girl for we can't make them to order.

No good from Germany till Nazism broken

STRAFORD, Ont., June 24—(CP)—Prince Bernhard, husband of Princess Juliana of the Netherlands, said in an interview at Juliana barracks here today that "no good can emanate from Germany until the spirit and doctrine of Nazism is broken completely and definitely for all time. That may take a long time but we will see that day as certain as we see the sun."

He was paying an official visit to the Royal Netherlands army stationed here.

"Most assuredly the Germany of Nazism and learning will be reborn, but first the pestilence of Nazism must be eradicated forever."

Prince Bernhard came to America for two definite purposes, he said. One was to see his wife and daughters, Princesses Beatrix and Irene and secondly to secure volunteers for the air force, men who will train to fly Spitfires in Britain and in the Netherlands East Indies.

The Prince has boundless faith in Premier Churchill and said "he will not lose ounce of his vigor and energy. He's an extraordinary man." He added that in Mr. Churchill, Britain has a leader who has not only the abilities regarding military but also the knowledge of how to tackle the problems that will develop after the successful conclusion of the war.

British name Minister to Washington

LONDON, June 24—(AP)—Sir Ronald Ian Campbell, until recently British Minister to Yugoslavia, was appointed tonight to be Minister to Washington, succeeding Sir Gerald Campbell.

Sir Gerald recently was named director-general of all British information services in the United States with headquarters in New York.

Neville Montagu Butler was appointed head of the American Department of the Foreign Office.

Other appointments announced tonight at the Foreign Office were: Sir Noel Hawlock Charles, Ambassador to Brazil, succeeding Sir Geoffrey Cox.

Ralph Clarmont Skrine Stevenson, Minister at Montevideo, succeeding E. Millington Drake.

Oliver Charles Harvey, former Minister in Paris, to be principal private secretary to the Foreign Minister.

John Balfour as Minister at the Lisbon Embassy.

Leslie Charles Hughes-Hallett as minister-resident in Quito, Ecuador, succeeding G. M. Bullock.

Peace offensive May follow if Russia defeated

LONDON, June 24—(CP Cable)—Hitler may well seek to launch a peace offensive if he succeeds in destroying Russian resistance and establishing a Quisling Government under his control, Clement Attlee, Lord Privy Seal, said in a broadcast tonight in which he warned "no one should be deceived."

Turks hear Nazis deep into Russia

ANKARA, June 24—(CP)—While foreign military attaches here heard today the German armies invading Russia had penetrated 120 miles and 80 miles respectively in two main thrusts, the official Turkish radio estimated that Germany had thrown 163 divisions against the Soviets and observed: "This number is too small."

Reports reaching here (and not confirmed elsewhere) declared Nazi armored divisions had reached well into the Ukraine, with an attack launched from Southern Poland, the aim being to isolate the rich wheat lands.

The second thrust, as reported here, was northward through Russian Bessarabia in an attack aimed ultimately at Odessa and other Russian Black Sea ports, Rumanian troops aided the Nazis in this attack, attaches heard.

(Reuters news agency reported from Bucharest that Rumanian troops had occupied Cernault, in the province of northern Bucovina
