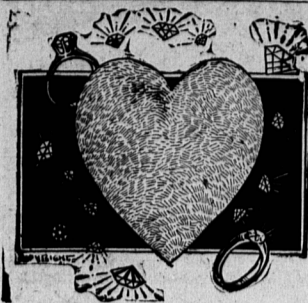

NEW YORK, Oct. 26.—Guests at the Wolcott were taken aback one day last week when a woman walked into the room carrying a wonderfully dressed doll. Inquiry at the clerk's office developed the fact that the woman was Mrs. Effingham Lawrence, of Baltimore, who is stopping at the Wolcott en route for her home. Mrs. Lawrence has just returned from Europe and while in Paris took up the latest fad of society there—carrying dolls.

Mrs. Lawrence explained that Parisian society has become imbued with an attachment for the bisque models of humanity, and no tea is considered complete without at least a dozen of these pets. The dolls are dressed with the greatest care in the latest toilettes, and are taken daily to the hairdresser's and beauty parlors. When Mrs. Lawrence seated herself at one of the tables and ordered two cups of tea, the waiter, with a visibly embarrassed expression, asked if "the baby, ma'am, would prefer a glass of milk?"

As though in ignorance of the attention she was attracting, Mrs. Lawrence ordered the waiter to draw up a chair for her doll and then sipped her tea nonchalantly. Her little guest was attired in precisely the same color scheme and manner of dress as Mrs. Lawrence, and received the most assiduous attention from her hostess. George T. DR CRIPPEN AT THE EDEN MUSEE

Among the many new figures recently installed in the Eden Musee of New York City, is a representation of Dr Crippen, who was on trial in London for the murder of his wife. The figure is made from sketches and measurements secured while he was before the Coroner's Jury, after his return from Canada. He occupies a special cell in the Chamber of Horrors, which has been occupied by the wax figures of scores of noted criminals. The other figures installed, make the Musee's collection unusually up-to-date. New figures are being prepared all the time. More attention than ever is being given to moving pictures in the Winter Garden. Elaborate pictures have been received from abroad and are displayed in different series each hour, afternoon and evenings. All the pictures are unusually interesting and far superior to those ordinarily shown. A number of these pictures have been taken exclusively for the Musee. They include feats of horsemanship, military review by kings and queens, the journeys in the out-of-the-way places, reproductions of great events and humorous and mysterious subjects. The afternoon and evening concerts have choice programs of popular and classical music.

LABOR OFFICIAL HINTS OF MORE DYNAMITING.

DENVER, Oct. 24.—Prediction by a national officer of a labor union that the buildings of three local newspapers whose pressmen are on strike will encounter destruction before the publishers win has startled the Denver trades and labor assembly. The speaker was Albert B. Kreidler, third vice-president of the International Printing Pressmen and Assistants Union of North America, who appeared before the assembly asking aid in the strike. When he had finished, a committee was appointed to investigate the situation.

"I tell you the buildings will blow up before this thing is settled the way the publishers want to settle it," he said. He finished his speech amid silence.
