### The Maritime Subsidies

Nova Scotia .....	\$875,000
New Brunswick .....	\$800,000
Prince Edward Island .....	\$125,000

These increases were voted in 1927, and have been paid to the Governments of the three Maritime Provinces in half yearly instalments ever since. But the reassessment recommended in the Report has not yet been undertaken, and this "irreducible minimum" is all that the Maritimes have yet received. The consequence has been that all three of the Maritime Governments have been struggling to make ends meet and that they have been obliged to defer such social measures as old age pensions, educational reform, and mothers' allowances, because of the studied dilatoriness of the Federal authorities in honoring the clear award of the Royal Commission on Maritime Claims.

At length, however, the imminence of a Dominion general election has prompted the King Ministry to belated action, and the long-delayed reassessment is to be proceeded with when it does take place, full allowance should be made for the delayed payments as a new and separate claim. In the general reassessment two board considerations shall have to be given due weight. One is that Ontario and Quebec have had extensive additions to their provincial resources out of the Federal domain. The other is that the Prairie Provinces are not only being ceded their public lands and natural resources, with ample compensation for such alienations as have been made therefrom by the Dominion Government, but that they are also being allowed subsidies which are double as large per capita as those now being paid to the Maritimes.
