COMBINED STANDING FIELDS AND THRESHED GRAIN COMPETITION, 1927

Cash Prizes for Field Oats, Wheat, and Barley and Certified Seed Potatoes

There will be competitions in the three counties where there are five or more entries each for wheat, barley, oats and for potatoes grown from certified seed.

The number of prizes in each County will be proportionate with the number of entries. Prizes will be paid according to the combined score of the standing field and of the threshed grain.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

- A field of oats shall consist of at least five acres, of wheat and barley three acres of certified seed potatoes two acres.
- An entry fee of \$1.00 shall be charged for the first, and fifty cents for each additional entry of grain and \$1.00 for each entry of potatoes.
- The entry fee shall accompany the applications.
- Entries shall be made to the Department of Agriculture, Charlottetown, not later than August 20th, 1927.
- Competitors shall notify the Department of Agriculture at least one week previous to date on which harvesting shall begin.
- Competitors are requested to note the following requirements for standing fields of oats only.
- The field must be seeded with (a) registered Banner Oats, or (b) seed from a field which has been sown with registered seed and inspected and approved while growing, or (c) seed from fields that have been two or more years in the competition and have scored not less than 241-2 out of 25 points for purity and approved by the Department of Agriculture. 8279-8-4-1st-41.

The Pine Tree Acadian

The New Week-End through service between Boston and Maritime Provinces points provided by the new train "The Pine Tree Acadian" is meeting with general approval as is evidenced by the numbers patronizing it, forming, as it does, a very convenient, yet quick means of transport between those points.

"The Pine Tree Acadian" leaves Boston every Friday at 3:20 P.M., Eastern Standard Time, arriving Saint John 5:10 A. M., Saturday, where connections are made with regular trains for Maritime Provinces points. Westbound, the passenger leaves Charlottetown, 2:00 P.M., every Friday, arriving Boston 8:50 P. M., Saturday, Eastern Standard Time. 8167-7-28-h21.

A Rest Train

There is a train that runs between Montreal, Toronto and Chicago which covers the distance in very fast time and is among the fastest on the continent. The "International Limited" leaves Bonaventure Station, Montreal, at 10:00 a. m., arriving Toronto at 5:40 the same evening and Chicago at 7:50 the next morning. "The International Limited" is an all-steel car train, and carries a radio equipped compartment observation library car. This is one of the finest and fastest trains operated by the Canadian National Railways and the fine roadbed makes for smooth riding.

An additional fast train has been put on the route between Montreal and Toronto, "The Inter-City Limited" which leaves Montreal daily at 12:30 p. m., arriving Toronto the same evening at 8:30 and which has proved a popular innovation.

SPRAMOTOR POTATO SPRAYER OUTFIT

Spramotor easy hand-spraying outfit, complete with cart. This outfit consists of one all-brass spramotor pump fitted in a 50-gal. oak cask. The cask has a brass drain plug for draining out all sediment, also a large strainer. At the rear of the cart is fitted the new bottom and top four row spray boom. It is adjustable to any width from 26 to 36 inches. There are three (3) nozzles to each row, one from above, and one from each side of each row. All parts that the mixture comes in contact with are brass or rubber. It is provided with a patent parallel nozzle adjuster that permits the stand pipes to be raised or lowered 20 inches and remain in perfect alignment and correct direction. The wheels of the cart are adjustable from 54 to 72 inches. This boom is illustrated on the power spray pump shown above.

Space will not permit a full description of the powerful, all brass spramotor pump. It is the well-known pump that has always given good satisfaction and is fitted with an all-brass agitator which positively keeps mixture properly mixed.
