## SEARCH FOR SILVER CAVE

KINGSTON, Ont., Mar. 1—Not as attractive, perhaps, as Captain Kidd's treasure in the Southern seas, but possessing more interest to Eastern Ontario residents is the lost Myers' cave of silver, located somewhere in the extreme rear of the county of Lennox and Addington. Efforts are now being made to capitalize at \$180,000 an exploration company to search for the hidden wealth, as a result of a preliminary quest made by S. E. Scott and his cousin, M. W. Sills, of Napanee. The story dates back about one hundred years ago, when Belleville was the trading place for furs from the Indians. One Myers was a storekeeper in Belleville, and became on very friendly terms with the Indians.

He had a son in poor health, who spent four years trapping and hunting with them on the shores of Lake Missanaga.

While the Indians traded with Myers, they from time to time produced specimens of solid silver, but would never tell from where it came. During the four years of young Myers' stay with them he discovered the location, so the story goes.

Flame and smoke were noticed and rumbling sounds heard, and the Indians being superstitious, would not go near it, but Myers explored and discovered a cave filled with solid metal in great quantities. He broke a quantity of the metal off with a hatchet, about half a bag full, and started for Belleville. But the canoe was capsized and the metal was lost. He reached Belleville, but the Indian who accompanied him died from pneumonia and young Myers burst a blood vessel and died in three days.

A minister, Frank Van Tassel, remained until he died and took from him a description of the location of the cave. Since that time, nearly one hundred years ago, search has been kept for the 'cave.' Last fall during the visit of a mind reader to Napanee, S. E. Scott went to her and asked her if he was going to be successful in his quest for a mine. She answered him "Yes." Inside of four weeks she said he would find the mine, which was only about three-quarters of a mile from where he was hunting for it. Later, Scott, accompanied by his cousin, Sills, left for Missanaga lake, and did find a hatchet such as was used a century ago, bearing the letter "M." rudely cut into it. Myers said in his story he left his hatchet stuck in a spruce tree. As the place had been burned over some years ago, and masses of stone and rock filled the hollow, they returned to Napanee, secured a lease of the property, and took steps to form a joint stock company.

ASKS FOR BATTLESHIP TEXAS.  
A movement is now on foot to have the United States battleship in Texas stationed permanently in Galveston harbor. The movement has the hearty support of a number of old battleship at the Indian Head prominent Galvestonians, and the improving grounds on the Potomac River project seems destined to be pushed forward with energy. It will be remembered that in a recent Washington despatch it was stated that the possibility existed that the Texas would never live to be rechristened the San Marcos. The rechristening was announced by Secretary of the Navy Meyer in response to a suggestion from Representative Burleson. However, it was stated that the Navy Department had under consideration the proposal to dismantle the vessel and turn her into a target. In such an event it was possible that the Texas would share the fate of the old monitor, Puritan, now lying in the mud of Hampton Roads, sink by an experimental discharge of nitro-glycerine. It was announced that the naval experts wanted to use the hearty support of a number of old battleship at the Indian Head prominent Galvestonians, and the improving grounds on the Potomac River

when they are released have no special training, going back easily to their old ways. The Texas could be stationed in the harbor and the boys could be placed under naval discipline during their term. It would benefit them, provide an institution not at present existent in Texas and add an interesting feature to our harbor that would be appreciated by visitors.  
The Texas, which classed as a battleship, has a displacement of 6315 tons. Her keel was laid in 1899. Her engines generate 8507 horsepower, her speed being 17 knots an hour. The cost of construction was \$4,202,121, and her armament consists of two 12-inch rifles, six six-pounder rapid fire guns, 12 six-pounder rapid fire guns, and four one-pounder rapid guns, besides several Colts.—Dallas News.
